## The Golden Future Of Prince Edward Island

Reviewing "The Golden Future" souvenir edition of The Charlottetown Guardian, the Montreal Gazette in its editorial columns says:

Canada's island province in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, which lays claim to being the cradle of Confederation, is going serenely on its sober way and with great hopes for the years to come—a happy condition of affairs which is exemplified in a souvenir edition of the Charlottetown Guardian, entitled "The Golden Future." This province in the sea is 130 miles long and varies in breadth from four to 34 miles. The whole island is eminently agricultural and pastoral and its light-red loam constitutes unusually fertile soil, which yields products in abundance, some of which are world-famous. There is no unemployment problem to speak of, even at the present time, and the Guardian number quotes Sir Henry Thornton as saying in a speech at Charlottetown on October 1, that Prince Edward Island is at present the most prosperous province on the C.N.R. system, "the only part which has shown an increase in business this season." The inhabitants are in a position to regard the future with equanimity.

The Hon. Frank R. Hearl, Lieutenant-Governor, is proud of the province and contributes a comprehensive article showing the record of the past and picturing the hopes for the future. The combination of fertile soil and progressive and highly-intelligent farmers, who have availed themselves of the expert assistance given by federal and provincial departments of agriculture, explains the state of richness achieved. In co-operative movements the farmers are advanced. In this way they have handled large quantities of eggs and poultry, while the Potato Growers' Association, with a membership of 3,000, last year handled 1,500,000 bushels. This year it is estimated that the turnover, including the sale of fertilizer, spraying material, etc., will reach \$2,500,000. Co-operative dairying is 40 years old and there is a great demand for P.E.I. dairy cattle, while the raising of bacon hogs is a profitable industry. Mixed farming prevails, the field crops in 1929 having been valued at \$1,700,000, an increase of nearly \$6,000,000 over 1928. Fox ranching is a famous island industry, and next in importance is fishing, which yields a revenue of nearly \$1,500,000. These facts warrant the Lieutenant-Governor in taking a most optimistic view of the future of Prince Edward Island, whose people, he says, are sober, law-abiding, God-fearing and intelligent. Tourists appreciate the island province and more will be welcomed, says the Guardian in its souvenir edition. It is a good part of old Canada that is described.
