Modern Atrocities Of War Protested

THEY FAR SURPASS THOSE OF ANCIENT TIMES IN VICIOUSNESS, DR. BONNELL HOLDS SEES MORAL RETARDATION New York Times Sept. 27th) The atrocities being committed in the world today by "supposedly civilized" people surpass those of the Assyrian conquerors centuries before Christ. The Rev. Dr. John Sutherland Bonnell declared yesterday in his sermon at the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, at fifty-fifth Street. He called upon "every church in Christendom" to protest the modern massacre of the innocents that is going on in China "in defiance of the laws of God and man."

"For years," he said, "we have been boasting of the material achievement of science and saying to each other 'Behold, this great Babylon which our hands have builded.'" "Today we realize that our mechanical advances have far outstripped the moral and spiritual man today is as Professor Julian Huxley has presented him, an irresponsible, mischievous child who has been presented with a set of machine tools, a box of matches

CHRISTIAN POLITICS

It seems very much easier for the most of us to see God in past history than to see Him in the movements and struggles of today. But ought we not to think of the spirit of the eternal Christ as battling its way through all the unrest and conflict of our time just as truly as it did in the first Christian Century or any other century of the world's history? We think of Jehovah as guiding and controlling the destinies of Israel, but we find it hard to believe that our God is guiding and controlling the destinies of this fair Canada of ours. But the one is just as true as the other ever was. And to deny it is to be a Christian while we are reading our Old Testament and an atheist while we are reading the morning paper. Isaiah was sure that God was interested in the politics of Israel in the eighth century before Christ, but we can be sure that He is just as interested in the politics of Canada in the twentieth century after Christ. As much depends upon this as upon that and He has as many interests and great causes at stake now as He had then. And to fail to realize that in the full-time way is to rob our life, both individual and national, of a strength and virility they ought to have. Elections ought to mean for the women of the W. C. T. U. a time of careful thought and conscientious action. British Columbia women and Nova Scotia women have both been called on recently to exercise this right of citizenship. Manitoba women may soon have to do so. Ontario women certainly have to very soon. There is a "sound of a going in the tops of the mulberry trees" federally. Many women when asked if they are interested in politics will say "No!" That is largely a misunderstanding of the word "politics." It is not an intensely interested in such matters as pensions for widows, pensions for the blind, enactments and the administration of the Sunday Observance laws, divorce laws, the creation of a Canadian spirit as opposed to racial or religious separatism. It is those who are all questions which must be settled by the Legislatures we elect.

Queen Elizabeth Patron Temperance Society

Queen Elizabeth has taken a step in the right direction and shown where she stands on this question. At the invitation of the Bishop of London, she has "very gladly consented to be a Patron of the Church of England Temperance Society." We are glad our young Queen, who will be the leader in social customs, has taken this moral stand. It is one more incident of the many which prove the trade in beverage alcohol is now on the defensive.

Trade on the Defensive

Public sentiment is gradually veering towards restriction, which, let us pray, will eventually turn to prohibition. This cannot come too soon for the sake of Youth, who are, as one writer has said: "Just children on their way to school again; These are the world's re-builders, these must bring Order to chaos, comforting to pain."

They are the builders of the nation's future and the task of this generation is to fit them to build wisely and well. In doing this we must never forget that the only indestructible material in destiny's fierce crucible is character. Character in habit crystallized. These are some of the great words uttered long ago by Frances Willard.
