WHY NOT AN ISLANDER?

We referred the other day to the fact that the Board of Railway Commissioners is about to be enlarged, and mentioned that Hon. H. R. Emerson is probably to be one of the new members of that body. In this connection the question arises, why should not one of the new appointments be given to this Province? No other section of Canada has more at stake or greater problems to solve in connection with transportation than have we and in no part of the Dominion is the problem more vital than here.

At present all the members of the Board are western men, Chief Commissioner Killam being from Manitoba and Commissioners Mills and Bernier from Ontario and Quebec respectively. As three more are to be added Prince Edward Island might fairly claim one of the six. Our case is the stronger from the fact that on the other Board of Railway Commissioners engaged in the construction of the Transcontinental Railway, which includes four Commissioners and a quite formidable engineering and clerical staff, no man from this Province has a place.

When the Board first referred to is filled up it will have six members and the Transcontinental Board has four making ten in all, with salaries of seven, eight and ten thousand dollars each. Between the two there is room enough to have every Province represented. Not only Prince Edward Island but the entire Maritime section of Canada would feel that only proper recognition had been extended if some good man from Prince Edward Island, familiar with our transportation needs were given a place among the new appointments to be made. We hesitate to name the man, but one could be found to fill the bill without going outside Liberal party lines, though no such restriction need be insisted on.

Various other Commissions have been appointed from time to time including one on transportation, but in all these cases this Province has been overlooked. And yet we have such important questions as the Tunnel, through freight rates, express rates and other matters vital to our very existence and in regard to which the Railway Commission as at present constituted is either not informed or is altogether negligent of our interests. Our Province should be represented on the Railway Board, by some one acquainted with and thoroughly loyal to Island interests and strong enough in ability and will to make his brother Commissioners take notice of our needs and requirements.

THE NEED OF THE BALLOT.

We need the ballot in our provincial and civic elections for the protection of the individual voter against intimidation and improper influences. This applies in the case of Government employees, the employees of individuals or firms, it applies to all who are in debt or in any way under the influence or control of others than themselves. The theory of elections in all free countries is that the voter shall

have a free and untrammelled choice in selecting his representative and that no representative can lawfully hold a seat to which he is elected by the purchase of intimidation, or the exercise of undue influence over the electors.

It is idle to say that undue influence and intimidation are not exercised under the system of open voting. Such influences enter more or less into every election, where the open vote prevails and ought to be eliminated. That has been the experience of all ages and all countries, and because it has been so almost every civilized country that has free representative institutions has adopted the ballot system. Today we know not where to find any country except our own Island Province in which a Parliament is elected by the antiquated system of open voting. Surely it will not be claimed that we are wiser than all the rest of the world in these matters.

The circumstances of Prince Edward Island are peculiar in this matter. The free vote by ballot in Canada was from the first held to be a sound Liberal doctrine. It was a plank in the platform of the various Liberal parties in the Provinces before confederation and in the Dominion after the union. Its adoption throughout the country was largely the work of Liberal statesmen. This makes it the more remarkable that in this Province after seventeen years of Liberal rule we still have open voting in our legislative elections and in choosing the members of Charlottetown City Council. Surely the time has come for a forward step in this matter, and we sincerely hope and trust that under the new Government and with the full concurrence of the Opposition this important and desirable reform may be adopted.

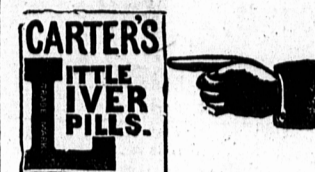
