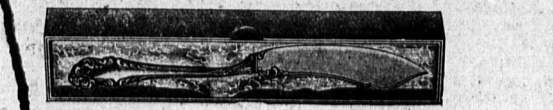

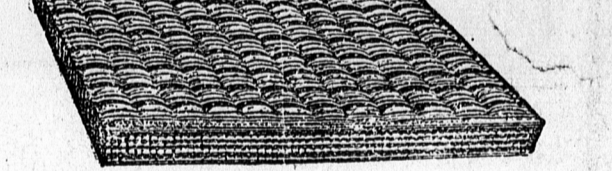

 Sir,—While the employers of the different branches of the civil service are claiming advances in their pay, owing to the advanced cost of living and other reasons, I would like to call the attention of your valuable paper to a class of civil servants namely Light Keepers around the coast of P.E.I. Island. While rendering a service second to none being faithful alike to the interests of the merchants and travelling public as well as the Mariner numerous lives and property depending on their diligence and care. While they are thus engaged they are yet the poorest paid of any employee in the service. In most cases their salary does not amount to one dollar per day.  
 In the past when wood was plentiful and easily obtain Light Keepers were allowed a sum sufficient to purchase that necessary article, yet of late years when wood can hardly be obtained at any price, that sum has been cut off from their already too small a salary. I would like to hear through the press from others who derive benefit from this class of civil servants.
