An affliction of more than ordinary sadness was occasioned in North Wiltshire by the calling away of Bertram Matthews to his eternal rest a few days since. The deceased, the youngest of a family of eleven was only thirty-two years of age. Until very lately he had enjoyed the best of health, scarcely knowing what it was to be sick, and though during the past few weeks he had not been feeling very well no one for a moment thought that the insidious bright's disease was doing its deadly work. When at length the serious nature of the malady became manifest, it was all too late to check its dreadful progress, and in less than a week after his sickness had made him cease to work his spirit passed from earth to heaven. Mr. Thomas was very largely attended showing the esteem with which the deceased was regarded by his friends and neighbors. He leaves besides a sorrowful widow and little son two aged parents, four brothers and five sisters to whom he had always been as a husband and father loving and indulgent, as a son and brother dutiful and affectionate.
