Sees Prospects "King" Carl Hubbell On Unlimited For Tourist Traffic

uncompleted. He was also greatly pleased with the Borden-Charlottetown highway. The whole highway system between the Island capital and summer resorts and the United States boundary line is of importance to our tourist trade, he pointed out. Every yard of paved highway in New Brunswick leading to Tormentine is an asset to Prince Edward Island. We must gear our publicity to the increased opportunities for motor traffic if we hope to capitalize fully on the great advance in road making in the Maritimes in recent years.

One thing noted by Mr. Newbery was the tendency of some motorists to "sneak ahead" of the line of waiting motor cars at Tormentine instead of waiting their turn to board the car ferry. There is nothing our Island people could do about that, but he thought the authorities should strictly enforce the rule of first come, first served.

He also noted that traffic signals in Charlottetown are not being very well observed, though this may be due to the influx of out-of-town motorists during Exhibition week.

Comments Exhibition For the Provincial Exhibition Mr. Newbery had the highest praise. It was, he conceded, one of the finest fairs he had seen in any part of the world. Both in attendance and in quality of exhibits and entertainment it would be creditable to a province many times the size of Prince Edward Island.

He was optimistic with regard to the Wood Islands-Cariboo ferry service. He noted the similarity to bring many additional visitors to the Province. Here again, he emphasized, we should be prompt to take advantage of the publicity value of this new service.

Chiefly, however, Mr. Newbery thought we should stress the excellence of our climate, our glorious sand beaches, our oysters, lobsters and other sea food, our farm and dairy products—all things in which summer visitors are greatly interested, and which are unexcelled in any part of the continent.

We should also remember, he said, that kindness, courtesy and politeness cost nothing, and bring invaluable results. On the whole, Canadian customs and other officials are noted for their courtesy, and there is general appreciation of this fact across the boundary line.

Prince Edward Islanders he has found to be as hospitable and courteous as any people in the world. It was nice to be told that "one of our own people" and to hear similar favorable comments from other visitors.

EDMONTON, Canada, Aug. 19.—Settlement of 80,000 Jewish refugees from Europe as farmers in northern Alberta is being considered by a syndicate of British newspaper publishers, Keith H. 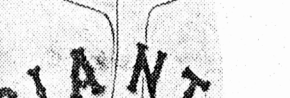
