PEACE MEETING BREAKS UP IN FIGHT.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—A conference at Cardiff, Wales, in favor of opening peace negotiations, which had been arranged by the National Council of Civil Liberties, was broken up Saturday the Cardiff correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company wires. A crowd of patriotic demonstrators broke into the hall and severe fighting resulted, although there were no casualties. The President of a South Wales Miners' Federation was in the chair. appeared to be mostly young men of military age. A number of women also were present. The crowd which broke up the meeting first paraded through the town, its ranks growing constantly until several thousand persons were in line.

When the demonstrators reached the hall in which the conference was being held they met with stout resistance from within, but eventually the doors were broken down. First fighting followed, in which it is reported that women delegates fought like tigers. Some stones thrown from without broke windows.

Mr. Thomas attempted to rally his supporters but was dragged from the platform and narrowly escaped serious injury. When the demonstrators were in full possession of the hall they waved flags and sang "God Save the King."

CISTERNS SAVE SOAP

The hardness of water is measured by degrees. When a gallon contains one degree of hardness, when soap is used with hard water, about 2 1/2 ounces of it per 100 gallons of water must be used for each degree of hardness, just to overcome hardness. It combines with the lime, forming a mineral product, and not until enough soap has been dissolved to overcome all the hardness does the soap do any good for cleansing purposes.

Some limestone waters contain as high as 20 degrees of hardness, and the cost of soap at six cents a pound amounts with an average family to \$12.80 a year. Washing soda at two cents a pound will soften the same water at an expense of \$1.50 a year. But a still better method is to have a cistern of soft water.
