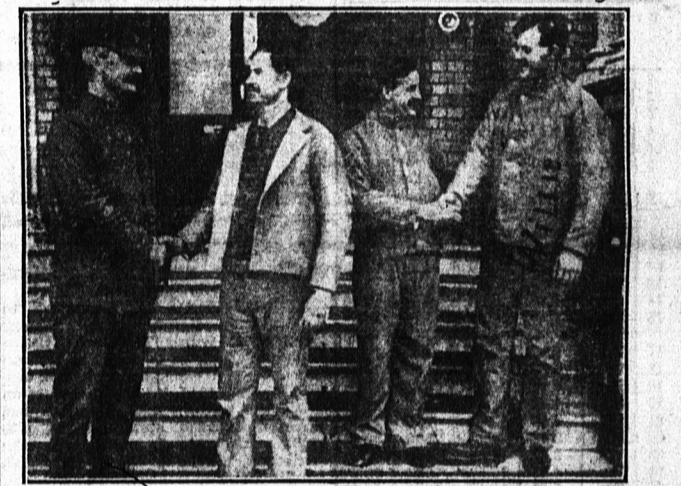

words stated that on behalf of the Patriotic Society he was pleased to welcome him. Hon. M. McKinnon, acting Premier, extended greetings on behalf of the Government and stated that as a neighbor he was proud to meet Private McQueen.

Private McQueen is a magnificent specimen of physical manhood standing 6 feet, 3 inches in height, and built in proportion. He has a splendid record as an all-round athlete, holding medals for jumping, pole vaulting, throwing the caber, hop, step and leap, and being a member of the tug-of-war team which defeated the crack Vancouver police team.

He stated however that he had received the medal for carrying wounded and dead out of that deadly zone known as "No Man's Land" while under machine gun, rifle and artillery fire. He succeeded in carrying no less than 52 men out of this deadly position to the British lines.

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
