

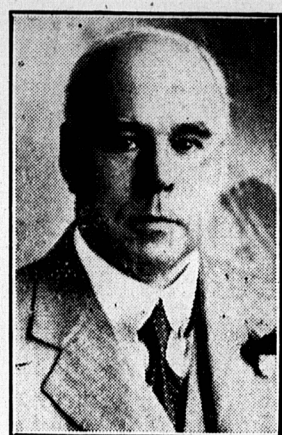

This year the championship was decided by each club playing each other club once. Several curlers present at last night's meeting felt that such a system in a playoff might not be satisfactory, as sometimes a rink might be defeated by an inferior rink in one game. Each club shall select in any way it decides the team it shall enter in the provincial championship tournament, the meeting decided.

March 1, 2, 3 and 4 have been selected as the dates for the Dominion curling championship bonspiel at Toronto, Secretary C. M. Williams announced last night.

The association decided to furnish the team going to Toronto with white sweaters and crests, Scotch curling caps, and souvenir buttons for presentation to competing rinks. The Montague team, provincial champions which represented the province at the bonspiel at Toronto this year for the McDonald-Brier Tankard and the Dominion championship, was provided with sweaters and caps and a small money donation from the Provincial Association.

The constitution of the Association was changed last night to provide for the holding of the annual meeting the first Wednesday in November instead of in May as originally provided. The semi-annual meeting in November was eliminated.

The question of the Association affiliating with the Dominion Curling Association was left in abeyance at least until next year. Curlers were informed last night that an invitation is being extended by the Halifax Curling Club to island clubs to play in Halifax this winter.

Harry Jeffra Scores Win Over Escobar

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—(AP)—Harry Jeffra, hard-hitting Baltimore batsman, defeated sixo Escobar, world's 118 pound champion, in a hard fought 10-round bout in the New York Hippodrome tonight. Escobar's title was not at stake. Weights were 121 for Escobar and 119 1-2 for Jeffra.

It was the Southerner's second victory over Escobar in a little more than two months. On Oct. 5, in Baltimore, Jeffra won on a split decision.

Tonight's verdict was roundly cheered by a crowd of 4,000 who paid \$6.40.10 to see the spirited struggle.

On Associated Press score card, Jeffra was credited with six rounds, Escobar, with three and one was called even.

There were no knockdowns but Jeffra narrowly missed scoring one in the second when he rocked the champion almost through the ropes with a vicious right to the pit of the stomach. Only the ropes saved Escobar from a visit to the deck.

Jeffra, paying his first visit to the big town, showed the fans he is a busy fighter, always on the go who can hit with either hand and take his full share of punishment. Except in a few scattered spots he kept the out-hit and out-boxed Escobar at the start, obviously waiting for a chance to slip over a haymaker, but once he did settle down and go to work, his timing was off and his punches lacked their customary authority.

Badly beaten the first two rounds, Escobar rallied to pull up on even terms with Jeffra through the fourth, but the Southerner forged into the lead in the fifth and from there on was never headed.

Red Sox And Athletics Conclude Only Deal In Dull Major League Session

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—Boston Red Sox today traded infielder Bill Werber to Philadelphia Athletics for third baseman Pinky Higgins.

The following six minor facts dominated the day's business:

1. All American League clubs except New York and Detroit agreed to play one night game against St. Louis Browns.

2. Both Leagues gave clubs permission to schedule Sunday double-headers after their third Sunday at home.

3. Ernie Quigley was appointed supervisor of National League umpires, succeeding the late Cy Rigler.

4. National League adopted a new type homeplate with beveled edges, designed to cut down injuries to players sliding into home.

5. Presidents Ford Frick of the National and Will Harridge of the American were directed by the owners to confer with baseball manufacturers on designing a new type of "dead" ball.

6. American League stipulated that its batting champion must be at bat 400 times during a season. Two deals were confirmed. Washington traded pitcher Earl Whitehill to the Cleveland Indians for pitcher Thornton Lee, who in turn was shipped to Chicago White Sox for pitcher Jack Salvo. And the aging Heinie Manush sold his contract to Brooklyn Dodgers.

Only Commissioner Landis and the Cardinal general manager, Branch Rickey, seemed in a position to produce a climax to the meetings.

Landis has been rebuked twice in the past two weeks by major and minor league club owners. Both majors and minors passed a rule which stipulated that a major league club, while still prohibited from signing a sand lot player directly, may recommend the signing of such a player to any minor league club.

Realizing that the club owners were determined to put this measure through, Landis asked that all such recommendations be filed through his office. The refusal of this request by both major and minor league club owners marked the first real challenge to the authority of baseball's High Commissioner.

Tomorrow Landis summons the major league owners before him, and the owners were obviously concerned tonight with what his reaction will be.

Most reliable information on the unreliable proposal that Dizzy Dean will be traded came from Branch Rickey, Bill Benswanger, president of the Pirate and Warren Giles, general manager of the Reds, who said:

"Rickey: 'I doubt if Dean will be traded.'
Benswanger: 'Rickey wanted me to include Arky Vaughan in the deal and I won't trade Vaughan.'
Giles: 'I still don't think we have a chance to get him.'"

New Brunswick Bonspiel Dates Announced

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Dec. 9.—The New Brunswick bonspiel will be held in Saint John Jan. 26, 27, and 28. This was announced tonight by F. W. Coombs, second vice-president of the New Brunswick branch of the Caledonia Curling Club, following a conference with members of the three Saint John curling clubs.

The bonspiel matches will be played in all three Saint John rinks—St. Andrew's, Thistle, and Carleton. The closing date for entries is Jan. 21.

Mr. Coombs pointed out that up to three entries for singles competition and one for doubles will be accepted from each club.

J. C. Chesley, of the Thistle Curling Club, was named chairman of the bonspiel committee and D. Smith of St. Andrew's Club and H. W. S. Subbs of Thistle Club, joint secretaries.

On the night of Tuesday, Jan. 26, a dinner will be tendered the visiting curlers by the combined Saint John Clubs.

Hockeyists Injured In Car Accident

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Dec. 9.—(CP)—Eric Hornquist and Hugo Mackie, members of the Dominion hockey team, were injured in a car accident and sent to hospital just after they arrived here this evening.

Preliminary examination showed Hornquist had a hurt knee and Mackie a skull injury—possibly a slight concussion. They will remain in hospital tonight, and x-ray examination of both cases tomorrow were hoped to determine the extent of the injuries.

Having played at Edmundston last night, the Dynamiters came here for a game with Saint John Seagulls tonight. Despite the unexpected casualties, it was decided to go ahead with the scheduled exhibition contest.

The Kimberley team planned to leave for Halifax tomorrow noon. They are due to sail from that port Sunday for a tour of Europe.

Whether or not Hornquist and Mackie would be able to continue with the team tomorrow was unknown tonight. Dr. C. L. Emerson thought that Mackie had a better chance than Hornquist of being able to leave for Halifax as planned.

"Swede" Hornquist, goalie, and Mackie, a forward, were riding from the railway station in a taxi with two other team members, Paul Rozack and Harry Robertson. The latter two escaped injury in a traffic mix-up when a street car struck a truck and the rear of the taxi at the same time. The accident occurred as the taxi was turning into Mill street from Pond street, only a few steps from the station.

Edmonton Grads Have Unique Record

EDMONTON, Dec. 9.—(CP)—Edmonton's Grads, renowned women's basketball team, held a party here recently to celebrate their 21st birthday, paid tribute to their general coach, J. Percy Page, and looked back on a record of 431 triumphs in 445 games played.

Past, present and future members of the perennial champions gathered about a big birthday cake studded with 21 candles. Other Grads in distant parts sent messages of congratulation, and sport officials and fans from all parts of the North American continent sent felicitations.

Probably no other athletic organization in the world can boast such a record. The Grads have held the provincial championship every year since the team's inception, except 1921; the Canadian crown every year from 1922 to 1935 (they did not try for the title this year) and the international title since 1923.

The happy reunion centered upon J. Percy Page, the school teacher who came to Edmonton from Hamilton, Ont., in 1915, when he organized the team which he has guided ever since. His organization is made up of the Grads, top team; the Gradelles, now a senior organization; the Comets, an intermediate outfit; and the Imps, the "babies."

As veterans retire Coach Page takes from the Gradelles as many players as are needed to fill the gaps. Three of last year's Grads have decided to quit the game. Betty Ross and Winnie Gallen have been picked from Gradelles to take their places. Another player will be chosen shortly.

Coach Page uses an unique system of promoting players to the Grads. When recruits are needed, Page, Coach Arnold Henderson of Gradelles and members of the Grads select by ballot members of the junior team which they think should step up to the Grad lineup.

"I have no misgivings regarding the team that will be representing the Grads next spring," Coach Page said at the party. "In practice against a boys' team, the Grads of today scored 43 baskets out of a total of 92 chances. We have no worries."

From W. H. Hardwicke, Vancouver, president of the Canadian Basketball Association, came a gold engraved medal for Mr. Page, "who has done more for basketball in Canada than any other man."

Coach E. O. Fenton, of Des Moines, Iowa, who has seen many of his great teams humbled by the Grads, sent a trophy to Mr. Page, who he described as "the most sportsmanlike coach I have ever met."

Kimberley Dynamiters Turn Back Saint John Sea Gulls

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Dec. 9.—Displaying a systematic attack at its best when inside the opposing blue line, Kimberley Dynamiters showed close to 2,000 Saint John hockey fans why their machine-line play was good enough to lift the Allan Cup last season. The fast skating, rugged aggregation from British Columbia arrived here tonight and blanketed the Saint John Seagulls 5-0.

Outspeeding the home six from start to finish, forcing the pace most of the way and back checking tirelessly, the visiting club scored twice in the first and third periods and once in the middle frame. Two of these markers were claimed as offside by Saint John. The Gulls forays against the winners often were turned aside by close marking in the neutral zone.

Playing four men inside the Gulls defence zone when opportunity presented, the Dominion champions lived up to their reputation for deadly, calculating offense. The western puckmen whipped passes about in bewildering fashion.

Gerry Lynch, youthful netminder for the homesters, was a standout performer. His miraculous saves held the score down while on the other hand goalkeeper Campbell of the victors had a fairly easy night with just 16 stops to Lynch's 39. Better combination and sturdy defence tactics played a large part in the exhibition victory.

Fery-topped George Goble, starry right winger of the champions, played a great game throughout. Ralph Redding, centre, replaced the injured Hugo Mackie, hurt in a city traffic accident before the game. Redding figured in three of the five goals. Also hurt in the same accident was Eric (Swede) Hornquist, goalie. Both remained in hospital overnight for observation, following a crash between a street car and their taxi.
