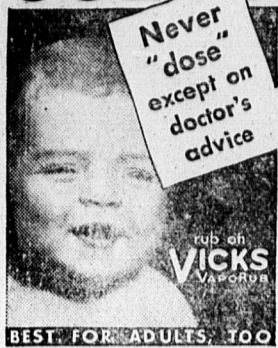

A Japanese scholar and philosopher, who has been traveling in this country, says that what we need most is to have ancestor worship introduced among us. By this he means that we need to have not only reverence for our elders and betters inculcated in us, but a respect for conventions.
