—REPEAT THEIR ACT.—The feed-delivery team of horses, owned by Mr. Maxime Gallant, which a month or two ago made a sensational runaway and came to grief in a fruitless attempt to lift Mr. J. M. Noonan's store from the foundation, repeated the endeavor on Monday forenoon in the same identical manner. The wheels of the heavy vehicle struck the side of Mr. Noonan's store with terrific force at almost the exact same spot where the collision last occurred, sending the shingles flying, knocking the both horses off their feet and badly demolishing the ice wagon, shafts wheels and other portions of it littering the land-side in all directions. It was some time before the frightened horses could be got to their feet, both somewhat dazed and scratched but not apparently seriously injured. —GIRLS' WORK.—It has been a busy week-end in Summerside for those interested in Girls' Work. Miss Marjorie Trotter, the Maritime Girls' Work Secretary, arrived in town on Saturday, to remain until Tuesday morning. On Saturday afternoon, a group of women met informally and decided to recommend to the churches the organization of a Girls' Work Board to give permanent support to the leaders of the C. G. I. T. work. On Sunday the various schools were observing Rally Day. Miss Trotter spoke in the Methodist service in the morning, urging the parents and teachers that they would take seriously the need of girlhood for such a program, and the need of leadership. She emphasized the fact that in its ideals and method of work, the C. G. I. T. Movement was worthy of loyal support. In the Baptist Sunday School Miss Trotter again spoke, this time addressing the girls themselves and calling upon them to build their lives according to the highest ideals. At four o'clock in the afternoon, a splendid service was carried through in the Baptist auditorium, under the auspices of the Canadian Girls in Training of all the churches. Miss Evelyn Sinclair presided at the service. Miss Cornelia White led a responsive devotional service on Citizenship. Miss Sibyl Gordon read a little story depicting the boyhood of Jesus. Miss Olive Saunders sang "Softly and Tenderly Jesus is Calling." Miss Jean Gordon presided at the organ and the Misses Sibyl Tanton and Marian MacArthur served as ushers. In a brief talk on "Wayside Altars," Miss Trotter pointed out to the girls the many ways in which they might waste their energy, such as in the pursuit of wealth or fashion, and urged them to reserve themselves for the "high calling of God." She said that by the cultivation of home life, by earnest study, and by loyal enthusiastic support of their C. G. I. T. groups in their churches, they might best prepare themselves for life.

—THRESHING.—Farmers are busy threshing. The wheat is turning out fairly well and is of good quality. The oats are proving a light crop, averaging 15 bushels per acre or even less, but the quality is fair. Those accustomed to feeding straw will be short of feed this winter. 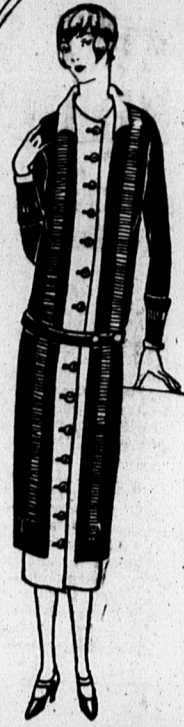
