EDITORIAL NOTES

Wepener, where fighting was reported as going on yesterday, is situated close to the Basutoland border, and 65 miles southwest of Bloemfontein. A wagon highway connects the two places in a direct line.

Mr. Flint's resolution in favor of prohibition by Provinces will be discussed in the Commons on the first Monday after the Easter holidays, April 23rd. The present appearance is that the majority will be found opposed to the principle.

THE GUARDIAN heartily endorses the resolutions adopted last evening by the Charlottetown Temperance Alliance copies of which will be found in another column. They call upon the Provincial Legislature to enact a prohibitory law for the Province, and urge upon the Federal authorities to pass a law giving the largest possible degree of prohibition to those provinces which gave majorities against the liquor traffic at the time of the plebiscite of 1898.

The regular quarterly meeting of the Board of Trade will take place this evening in the Board Rooms, McEachern's Building, where they will hereafter be held. It is to be hoped there may be a full attendance. The Board of Trade is one of our most useful public associations which receives no aid from the city or province and has yet rendered valuable service in its time to both. Every merchant, manufacturer and business man ought to be a member of the Board, and those who have not yet joined are reminded of the opportunity to hand in their names to the popular Secretary, Mr. W. W. Clark.

If it is true, as is reported that Kruger's emissaries are on the way to offer to the United States a protectorate over the Dutch Republics the Boer President has shown no great measure of astuteness in announcing the fact. In the first place the United States Government would be most unlikely to undertake such a responsibility at anytime and especially not at a time when it could only mean war with Great Britain. That would be inevitable. In the next place it is quite undattering to the officious continental European friends of the Transvaal that they should all be passed over in order that the protectorate might be offered to another and an English-speaking nation. What is most probable is that the protectorate story is purely a newspaper invention.

Admiral Dewey is coming in for plentiful criticism in giving out his willingness to become a candidate for the Presidency, and on account of the terms in which his decision is made known. It will be remembered that when, some months ago, he was approached on the subject he signified very modestly that he did not believe he had the qualifications a Chief Magistrate of the Republic should possess. Since that time he appears to have re-studied himself and the position and has either risen in his own esteem, or formed a lower estimate of the requirements of the office, or both. He has now made up his mind that the office is not a very difficult one to fill, "the duties being mainly to execute the laws of Congress," as he puts it. This is not a very exalted view of the position. But a chief objection is to Admiral Dewey's attitude toward the two great parties. He has not intimated a preference for either. Possibly he is of the opinion that both parties will compete for the honor of nominating him. But this is not now probable.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted: 1. Resolved that our Local Legislature be urged to pass a provincial prohibitory law. 2. Resolved that the Federal Government be urged to pass a law giving the largest possible degree of prohibition to those Provinces which gave a majority vote in favor of prohibition at the recent plebiscite election.

Fatal Accident.

A man by the name of Thomas Kavanagh was fatally injured by the incoming train from the west yesterday afternoon near St. Dunstan's College. He was first seen by the driver lying on the track, and the train was slowed, but could not be stopped in time to prevent an accident. The locomotive struck the unfortunate man, hurling him from the track and fracturing his skull. He was picked up and removed to the Charlottetown Hospital in an unconscious condition. He died shortly after without regaining consciousness. His home had been a short distance outside the city.
