Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

A GRAPHIC DESCRIPTION OF MODERN MILITARY HOSPITAL

Sir,—A short time ago I sent you a general description of a temporary Military Hospital as these are called here. Now I shall try and convey to your readers an idea of how one of these is conducted.

Each of these has a Commanding Officer usually a Lieut-Col. a quarter Master, a company officer, besides the staff of physicians and surgeons, nurses and orderlies.

It goes without saying that the O. C. has full control over the institution and man as well as every department is responsible to him. He in his turn is responsible for the efficient of the Hospital to the War Office. His duties are therefore multitudinous. He must know how each department should be run and what is expected of those in charge of them.

STORES AND STORE KEEPING

The quarter master is a very important officer. His department has to provide all the stores and to keep every thing required by the hospital stocked up so that nothing runs out. He is responsible for the equipment of the hospital and in a moment must be able to tell where all the Government property entrusted to him is. A receipt is taken from every one to whom articles are issued. The ward equipment is placed in charge of the head nurse of the ward and she gives her receipt for it.

MATRON AND NURSES

The matron has charge of all the nurses. Her duties whose full extent I do not know are almost as multitudinous as those of the O. C. or the quarter master. She assigns the sisters to the various wards and has a general supervision over their work and their conduct.

lines, admits all patients who come to the hospital, if he thinks they need hospital treatment, and assigns them to their respective wards. He must see that the morning sick reports which each of these must have are in order and properly signed by the regimental M. O. He makes a tentative diagnosis of each case and assigns him to either the medical or surgical side. He also treats minor cases that can return to their own units. In the absence of the regular M. O. of the ward in cases of emergency he administers such temporary treatment as in his judgment the case requires. He sleeps at the hospital to be on hand if he is needed. All members of the staff take in turn the duties of M. O. O.

The duties of the various M. O.'s are pretty much the same as those of the civilian medical man. He has full charge of the ward and every one in it is subject to his orders. Besides his usual professional duties, he orders the diets which must have his signature before the steward can serve them. His diagnosis must be in accordance with the nomenclature of the W. O. in case history must be written up. When the patient is fit to be discharged his monthly diet and case sheets must be signed and the patient sent on to the O. C. who discharges him or sends him back as he deems best. After the patient is discharged or dies proper returns must be made out and attested to according to rules. When a man's illness renders him unfit for further military duties the M. O. must fill out and sign in triplicate or quadruplicate a most elaborate document the slightest error in which will bring it back to be done all over again.

DUTIES OF M. O.

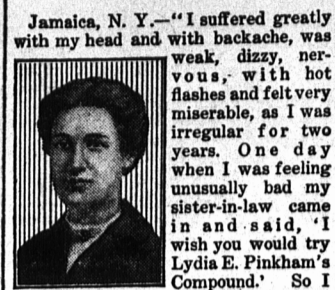
