In vegetables there were ripe and green tomatoes at 6 and 4c per lb, respectively, cucumbers each 3 to 5c, cauliflower 5 to 10c, carrots, beets, parsnips per bunch 5c, cabbage 3 to 5c each, turnips 2c each, string beans per qt 4c, peas per pint 12c, celery per head 5c, squash 5 to 10c. Chickens per pair sold from 40 to 50c. New potatoes brought from 40 to 50c, per bus. The price of hay per cwt. was 35c, and oats per bus. 45 to 50c.
