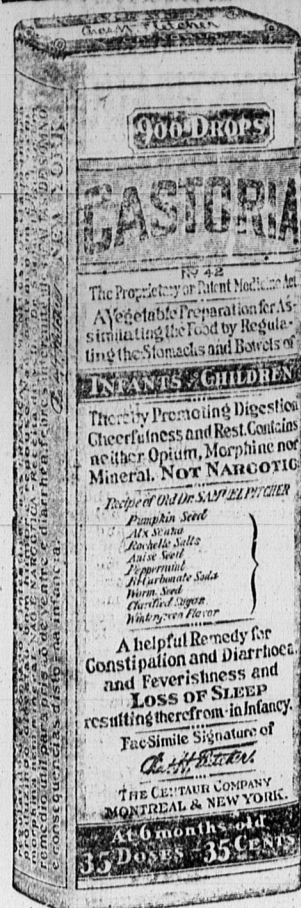

LECTURE ENJOYED.—Despite the inclemency of the weather a goodly audience assembled in St. Andrew's Church, Orwell, on Thursday night, the twenty-fourth inst., to listen to a lecture "True Democracy" delivered by Rev. Dr. McEwen. The members of the Orwell Red Cross Society having undertaken to maintain a prisoner of war, are to be congratulated on procuring the services of so able a gentleman. Dr. McEwen who is recognized as one of the provinces most able Pulpit Orators proved conclusively that there are other fields of labor that he can fill with just as much ability as the pulpit, for with his able and pointed arguments coupled with ready wit and well told anecdotes he held the audience spell-bound all through his lecture and all too soon he took his seat amid the hearty applause of an appreciative audience. The lecture was supplemented by a short programme arranged by the capable organist Mrs. T. R. Ings. The opening chorus, "Stand by the Flag" sung by the Church choir was much in harmony with the theme of the lecturer. Mr. Milton Furness who is so well-known as an orator on all the stages of the district, again showed his mastery ability in his rendition of "A Cavalry Charge" Mrs. J. F. Ross enraptured the audience with a patriotic solo rendered in her own capable style. Then came the intermission period of candy during which the Chairman read two letters from the Orwell Red Cross prisoners of war. The next number was a solo by Miss Iona McLeod, who is (to say the least) one of the most talented and best educated vocalists. Miss Jessie Nicholson in reading the poem "The Fool," displayed the much coveted act in elocution known as natural expression. She received a hearty encore in which she responded with "The Scottish Grenadiers." A chorus was then sung by the choir, after which a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer and all who assisted in making the function such a grand success. Mrs. L. R. Ings acted as accompanist and Mr. Milton Furness very ably performed his duties as chairman. The meeting closed with the National Anthem. The receipts of the evening were in the vicinity of twenty-five dollars.
