MORNING MAIL DELIVERY SERVICE RESTORED ON HOLIDAY MONDAYS

According to an announcement made by Postmaster General William P. Mulock, the usual morning mail delivery will be resumed on statutory holidays falling on a Monday. There will also be a mail delivery service on Christmas Day.

Early in the year the Post Office Department, in keeping with the general policy of the government to effect, where possible, operating economies in the administration of public departments, discontinued a mail delivery service on holidays. Since, however, the Honorable Mr. Mulock assumed the post of Postmaster General he has been studying the question in the light of the vital need for a regular daily mail service over present day congested conditions. While Postmaster General Mulock points out that the need for economy is still just as acute as ever, he realizes that with Canadian mail service to the overnight schedules, in many cases night and day for seven days a week, they should not be deprived of a mail service over a long weekend where a holiday falls on Monday.

Commencing, therefore, with next Monday holiday, Thanksgiving Day, which falls on October 14th, there will be a morning mail delivery service.

Postmaster General Mulock also states that on Holiday Mondays a four hour postal wicket service will be resumed instead of the two hour service now in effect.

In Memoriam

MRS. ERNEST MULLIGAN

There passed away in the Prince County Hospital on August 25th, 1940, Margaret, nee McKenna, dearly beloved wife of Ernest Mulligan of Detroit, Mich. After a brief but heroic illness, during which she had had the best medical skill available and careful professional nursing.

The late Mrs. Mulligan was herself a registered nurse, a graduate of the nursing school of Charlottetown Hospital and where she and her sisters, Kathleen and the late Mrs. P. B. Butler, of the same hospital, were general favorites rendering care and attention to all patients entrusted to their care.

After practicing her profession for some time in this province, Pearl, wishing to acquire more advanced skill took a post graduate course in Corey Hill Hospital, Brookline, Mass., after the completion of which she returned to Detroit, Mich., where for five years she did general nursing very successfully.

She was married in Kinkora, P. E. I., to Ernest Mulligan, a native of Kinkora, P. E. I., and the children, Mary Ernestine Joan, who died in infancy and Ernest Don, who survives and who is father-in-law of Mrs. Mulligan, a devoted and devoted mother and wife.

Mrs. Mulligan had recently had a severe operation under the care of Dr. P. B. Butler, of the same hospital, and apparently made a splendid recovery which was the cause of relief and rejoicing among members of her family and many friends.

Coming with her young son to visit her old home and to recuperate and regain her former health and she was stricken again at the home of her sister, Mrs. Alfred Curley, Free town, who with her mother Mrs. Rose McKenna nursed her tenderly and lovingly. The attending physician Dr. Grant of Summerside advised removing her to the County Hospital, her devoted Mother and companion, her sister, remained with her until the end which came gently and peacefully to our dear Pearl, who went with devout resignation and a trusting faith to meet her loving Saviour.

To me who knew her well the passing of Pearl McKenna Mulligan is a keen reminder of the grief of a dearly beloved friend called so early to her eternal home; but cherished memories of her gay and sunny disposition and her deep religious convictions remain and will ever remind us that this life is but transient and eternal life in God's good grace is our hoped for goal.

The last consoling rites of the Catholic Church were administered by Rev. Monsignor Monaghan and her remains were removed to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Mulligan, where her numerous relatives and friends gathered to pay their last tributes of love and respect and to extend their sympathy to her bereaved husband and son and sorrowing Mother.

The funeral Mass which was very largely attended was held in St. Malachias Church, Kinkora, Rev. Dr. P. J. Smith officiating and Rev. T. B. Butler, of the same parish, present in the Sanctuary after which the mortal remains of Pearl McKenna Mulligan were laid to rest beside her beloved sister Kathleen, who predeceased her several years ago.

Commends Fine Work of C. N. R.

MONTREAL, Sept. 30 - Hon. J. L. Ralston, Minister of National Defence, in a letter to the Hon. S. J. Hangerford, chairman and president, Canadian National Railway, expresses appreciation of the efficient cooperation of the national system in the evacuation of the Department of National Defence in the recent movement of more than eleven thousand troops to the eastern seaboard. The communication is reproduced in the October issue of the Canadian National Magazine, out today, to the president of the Canadian National system, Hon. Mr. Ralston writes, "I am glad to hear that this opportunity, on behalf of the Department of National Defence, of expressing my deep appreciation of the part your railway has taken in a noted movement of more than 11,000 troops to Halifax for service abroad."

Mr. Ralston recalls that this movement to the seaboard commenced on August 17th and terminated on August 24th while at the same time there was in progress a counter movement by which thousands of refugees had to be evacuated from the same port. Despite the fact that the evacuation of the Minister states that this considerable number of troops arrived on schedule at the port, with but three minor exceptions.

Mr. Ralston writes, "I especially wish to thank you for the close cooperation of your officials with officers of my Department, in the working out of the various movements allocated to your railway."

Mr. Hangerford in acknowledging the letter replied, "because of other concurrent and pressing demands on the operating department officers and staff, I am unable to give careful attention to the details of arrangements and exercise some ingenuity in provisions for the efficient and expeditious movement of the troops in question and the receipt of your letter will therefore be a source of gratification and encouragement to them, as it is to me. I have just returned from an extensive tour of inspection over our lines in Western Canada. I am sure you will be glad to know that I found amongst the staff everywhere a determination to contribute by every means in their power to the satisfactory conduct of the nation's war effort."

Expect Thousands at Ploughing Match

The international ploughing match and machinery demonstration which will be held on October 15, 16, 17 and 18 inclusive, under the auspices of the Ontario Ploughing Association, on the Ontario Hospital Farm and adjoining farms at St. Thomas, Ont., will, it is expected, be attended by thousands of farmers and others interested in agriculture. Over 15 acres will be covered by the exhibits of the latest types of farm and home machinery which is estimated to be worth more than \$600,000.

A very large number of teams will be on hand and will be established on the site of the ploughing space for tractors. The entire area of the meeting and hydro service will have room for 10,000 cars.

FIBRE FLAX SEED EXPORT

According to a report by the Agricultural Supplies Board, negotiations carried on with the Government of Northern Ireland have resulted in an agreement by the Government to take all Canadian fibre flax seed of the 1940 crop at the following prices: Certified No. 1 seed, \$6 per bushel; No. 2 seed, \$4.25 per bushel; No. 3 seed, \$4 per bushel. These prices represent an advance of 50 cents per bushel for Certified No. 1 seed. The prices for the other grades mentioned are the same as those paid for seed of the 1939 crop.
