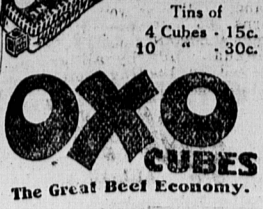

a politicalism based on violence. A small minority of agitators headed by Mr. DeValera, are making a stable government quite impossible.

"Ireland is fairly strangled by politics. One feud follows another. There is a new split almost every week."

"The ablest man in the present Irish government is Kevin O'Higgins, the vice president. He is a lawyer, a patriot, and a shrewd politician as well. He has now become the leader of the extreme Right, as opposed to DeValera, who is leader of the extreme Left."

"O'Higgins has a definite constructive policy. He believes in the Free State and does not want a Valerian Republic. He wants to drop the Irish language and the feud against Ulster and England. He wants to bring in English and American capital and develop Irish resources."

"It is generally believed, both in England and Ireland, that 1925 will be Ireland's decisive year."
