## REGULAR MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL

A Large Number of Important Questions Discussed.—Law Relating to Sale of Fish Will be More Stringent.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last night.

The report of the Street Committee was read by the chairman, Coun. Paton.

The limited sphere covered by the watering cart was discussed by Couns. Hooper, Paton and Whear and the contractor for the second watering cart were severely criticized for not complying with terms of contract.

The interest taken in the work on the streets by Coun. Paton was referred to in a complimentary manner by a number of the Councillors present.

Coun. Hooper reported upon the work in connection with Pownall Wharf and upon Government Pond. On the latter he had spent \$300. He recommended that the work be completed. It was pointed out, however, that the amount necessary could not be expended this year in view of other large expenditures.

The erection of a new weigh scale house was discussed at length and it was finally decided to call for tenders for the construction of either a brick or wooden building. It is also the intention to fit the second story up as a restaurant.

Coun. Hooper reported upon the extension of Douglas Street to Highland Avenue. The committee who had the matter in charge reported that the amount asked for land was \$100 and that it would be necessary to build a stone culvert which would cost \$300 more. The matter was left in the hands of the same committee to meet with W. A. O. Morson to see if he would allow payment for land to stand over until next year.

Coun. Paton asked if it was the intention of the City Council to place telephones in the outlying parts of the city

or fire purposes. It was decided that such action was not necessary.

Coun. Paton then enquired after the music for the Square and as a result a committee was appointed consisting of Couns. Stewart and Hooper to deal with the matter and to spend \$100 on it.

Worship asked if the committee on rearrangement of lights throughout the city were ready to report. The chairman said that report would be compiled for the next regular meeting. It was suggested to the committee that light should be placed near the Pasteurized Milk Factory, and on Richmond Street.

Coun. Paton asked the Council to select a position for the new drinking fountain which he proposed giving the city. The Mayor thanked Coun. Paton on behalf of the city and said the Council in a body would attend to the location as soon as the fountain arrived.

Coun. Paton reported that the street committee had decided to remove the crane at the lower end of Richmond street which had been complained of for a year.

Coun. Stewart asked for permission to trim and possibly remove some of the trees near the manse of St. James' Church. The Surveyor was delegated to attend to the matter.

A request for a light near St. Peter's Church was considered and notice of a motion at next night to place a light was given.

The liberties now enjoyed by the fish mongers were then curtailed and from now on fishermen will not be allowed on the Square before eight o'clock on the evening before market day and they are required to be away again at four p. m. on market day.

## A YEAR OF DISASTER AN ANNUS MIRABILIS

In the Year 1902—Disaster of Six Months Have Cost 100,000 Lives—Some Other Terrible Fatal Years Recalled.

The year 1902 is likely to go down in history as an "annus mirabilis," by which term the year of special disaster have been known through the ages.

Although just about half finished, 1902 already has to its record an appalling loss of life throughout the world.

No fewer than 100,000 human beings have fallen victims. Less than half of these deaths occurred at Martinique, through Pelee's frightful eruption. The remainder were occasioned by other catastrophes, the earthquakes in Guatemala, the floods in China, and the mining disasters in the United States and Canada.

Close students of history predict more terrible calamities to follow, basing their predictions chiefly on the common belief that "misfortunes never come single."

In the calamities of the present year, it is easy enough to imagine a connection, for all may be explainable as due to cosmic forces of some sort. In another dreadful year, that of 1665, in England, there is no apparent reason why one disaster followed another. That was the year following the occurrence of the black plague, which had swept over London, completing its devastation by leaving 100,000 dead. Then

came the great fire that ate out the central portion of London. Spain suffered from a great drought that dried up the springs and shrivelled the crops. At the same time the fertile fields of Germany and the Rhine Valley were laid waste by floods. Italy was shaken with earthquakes. There were signs in the heavens, and there were numerous bloody wars.

The year 1765 was made an "annus mirabilis" by the Lisbon earthquake, entailing a loss of life estimated variously at from 100,000 to 150,000.

One of the most terrible years of the East was that of A. D. 441. Constantinople was laid in ruins by an earthquake that was felt all over Asia Minor and the Aegean and Black Seas. The Empire was in the throes of Hunnish invasion. The Scythian cavalry were devastating the valley of the Danube. The year 742 A. D. was likewise memorable for the most destructive earthquake since the world began. Syria and Palestine were the centre of disturbance, 500 cities and villages being shaken into ruins and 250,000 people killed.

And now comes the Johnstown, Pa., mine disaster, in which it is believed more than 200 lives have been lost.
