MASTERPIECE IN ART GALLERY

MONTREAL, Sept. 30.—(By The Canadian Press)—Carl Thomtays painting masterpiece "The Man of Sorrows" hangs on the wall of a Montreal gallery where it has been a temporary home. The large canvas is on exhibition here for a few days. Dramatically conceived and executed, the painting portrays the figure of Christ, the form of a prostrate man praying alone near the Sea of Galilee at night. The face of Christ is not revealed. The rendering of the atmospheric condition is worthy of an eminent landscapist while the painting of the figure of Christ shows rare knowledge and skill. The deep shadows from the cliffs in the background furnish a contrast to the brilliantly-lighted figure of the prostrate Christ. The artist is moderate in his treatment of the sky which has a calm glow. A remarkable brilliancy is given in the Evening Star which glimmers like the actual point of light in the pale gray of the twilight sky. The dramatic element of the scene is intensified by the effective pattern of light and shadow, the fissures in the cliffs forming most emphatic divisions of tone, all tending to enhance the expressions of the figure.

The artist who is one of the ablest religious painters living, executed the landscape for "The Man of Sorrows" in the vicinity of the Sea of Galilee, a glimpse of which may be seen glistening in the pale moonlight. Thomtays was born in Copenhagen 57 years ago. He began the study of art as a boy of 15. His greatest achievements are biblical scenes and subjects. NUT CROQUETTES Three-fourths cup milk, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 tablespoons butter, 3/4 cup chopped nut meats, 3/4 cup soft bread crumbs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 egg, dried bread crumbs. Melt butter in sauce pan, stir in flour and when bubbling add milk, stirring constantly. Cook and stir until mixture boils. Add nuts, bread crumbs, salt, and parsley, and mix thoroughly. Spread on a buttered platter to cool. Shape in small balls, roll in dried bread crumbs, dip in egg, slightly beaten, and roll again in crumbs.
