S'ide Teachers Hear Lecture On Reading

On Monday, October 24, the teachers of Summerside and surrounding districts were privileged to attend a lecture and demonstration on reading in the High School Auditorium by Miss Allie Hahn. Miss Hahn, who is an expert in her work, possesses a most charming personality and at no time during the day did she become monotonous or tiresome, keeping her audience of 137 teachers and a number of visitors alert throughout the morning and afternoon sessions. In the morning she demonstrated teaching a lesson in Grade III, determining the steps necessary before the actual reading takes place. After the children left the auditorium she explained the reason for each step she had taken in the presentation: (1) Preliminary Development; (2) Building up a background; (3) Sight vocabulary; (4) Stimulate clearly of mental images for each step she had taken in the presentation; (5) Phonics; (6) Structure Clues and the use of the dictionary. A discussion followed and many teachers took advantage of the opportunity to ask questions to clear up their own individual problems. At the close of the talks of the teachers were conveyed to Miss Hahn by Rev. Sister Mary of Carmel, Kinkora, Mr. Donald MacLean, Tyne Valley, and Mr. C. B. Jelly, Supervisor. An expression of appreciation was also conveyed to the W. J. Gage Co. who made this demonstration possible, through Mr. John Cozzi, who accompanied Miss Hahn as the business manager. The meeting was brought to a close by singing the Island Hymn and The King.
