RIVULETTES ADVANCE TO DOMINION FINALS

Hold Primroses To One All Draw In Second Game

Visitors Win Round 5-1. Spectacular Net-minding By Both Goalies Features Saturday Night's Tilt.

A fighting band of feminine hockeyists, the Summerside Primroses entered Crystal Rink Saturday night with the glint of battle in their eyes, staged a sensational comeback, and held Preston Rivulettes to a 1-1 draw in the final game of their series for Eastern Canada honors.

The Primroses carried the play to their opponents through most of the game, but the Rivulettes' smart passing aggregation managed to prevent dangerous attacks that gave Dot Harris some spectacular net minding. She, however, proved practically unbreachable, and turned aside all but one of their lightning shots on the net.

TEAMS CAUTIOUS

A scoreless and somewhat cautious first period saw the Primroses gaining confidence and playing far smoother and faster hockey than on Friday night. For the second stanza the Rivulettes were one player short for a total of nine minutes as referees Silliphant and MacQuarrie, keeping a close watch on their activities, waved four of them to the cooler through the period. The local squad forced the issue and were rewarded when Irene Silliphant's hard drive eluded Ranscombe half way through the session. The Rivulettes counter came in the final frame, when H. Schmuck beat Harris on a close-in shot. The Primroses were going strong for the last ten minutes of play and penetrating the hitherto unbreachable Preston defence. The locals forced Ranscombe to the utmost to clear their shots.

PRIMROSES FORCE PLAY

The initial period saw the fighting Primroses sextette open a fast power play and for the better part of a minute, mixed it in a wild melee around the Preston net. The visitors finally cleared and settled back into a semi-defensive form of play, contenting themselves with breaking up the locals' combination thrusts. The Rivulettes gradually put on the pressure and staged an exciting fast passing attack behind the Summerside blue line bombarding Dot Harris with a variety of shots which she capably turned aside. Two minutes before the end of the session Minnie Eosell drew a one-minute penalty for catching and holding a Preston shot. With just a few seconds to go N. Ranscombe drew a rest for tripping and the Primroses forced the pace. Starting the second stanza a player short, the visitors adopted a defensive style of play and staved off the dangerous rushes of the thoroughly aroused home squad. No sooner had they returned to full strength when H. Schmuck drew a penalty and the Primroses raged around the net. The locals' unceasing attack was finally rewarded when, taking advantage of M. Schmuck's banishment, they bottled up the visitors behind their own blue line. BRUINS TRIM TORONTO LEAFS AT HOME 7-4

MONTREAL, March 10—Definitely eliminated from the National Hockey League play-off race but with one eye cocked on next year's contracts, Detroit Red Wings continued their spurt for the finish line today following a brilliant 5-3 win over Montreal Canadiens at the Forum here last night.

TORONTO, March 10—The big, bad Bruins from Boston, boasting openly that they wouldn't mind at all playing Toronto's Maple Leafs in the National Hockey League finals, have left unquestioned proof in this stronghold that if any team is to humble the Leafs in the playoffs it might as well be the Bruins.

Before the biggest crowd to jam Maple Leaf Gardens for hockey this season—14,213—Boston beat down a fumbling Toronto defence last night and whipped in four goals in the third period to win 7-4, and climb into the American section lead. The Bruins stepped a full game ahead of Chicago Black Hawks.

Babe Siebert and Red Horner of the Leafs waved sticks at each other near the end and both drew major penalties.

ST. LOUIS, March 10—(A.P.)—New York Rangers flashed championship form to turn back the scrappy St. Louis Eagles 5-1 in a National Hockey League match Saturday night.

The victory assured the Rangers of third place in the American division, but Detroit Red Wings still may tie them for the playoff position.

SCHMELING HANDS HAMAS TERRIFIC BEATING LAUNCHES COMEBACK AUSPICIOUSLY

"Black Uhlan" Completely Outclasses U. S. Contender In Match to Meet Baer.
