## BONSPEIL AT FORUM PROVES HUGE SUCCESS

### Gala Day For Curlers As Successful Season Is Brought To Close

The "roarin' game" had its innings at the Forum yesterday as local curlers rang down the curtain of a banner season in a series of keenly played matches with Halifax, Summerside and Montague rinks. It was "curlers day" and armed with besom and stone they took over in fine style. The roar of the rock, the swish of the broom, the curt commands of the skips held away from early morning until well into the evening as the players plied the five rinks of the spacious ice sheet with camaraderie and good fellowship predominating.

The visiting teams arrived in the city Monday night and were welcomed by Premier Campbell and Mayor Turner at a banquet held in their honor at the Charlottetown Curling Club. Last night a farewell banquet was tendered the visitors. The Halifax curlers led by vice-president P. O. Soules were warm in their praise of the splendid competition and the right royal reception given them by the local club under President W. L. Brenton and D. A. MacKinnon, president of the provincial association.

Other curlers who spoke briefly saw through such fraternalism not only the furthering of the curling game itself, but a more general understanding along other lines of the betterment of the Maritimes as a whole. During the bonspiel, Charlottetown finalists in the junior trophy play met and defeated Summerside and Montague rinks to capture the Regal cup emblematic of the Island Junior championship and donated through Mr. W. W. Lord. The local club team won the Montague 14-10, and from Summerside, 9-5. Following is the champion team: Skip Art Spillet, W. Houston, Will Duffy and J. Walker.

Climaxing the day's sport was the evening's play. Curlers gathered at the rink shortly after 8 o'clock and to strains of martial music by the Legion band paraded around the rink headed by Mr. H. St. C. Silver, veteran Halifax curler, and marshalled by Col. Adams, also of the Halifax club.

### Dodgers Are Mystery Team Of League

(This is the third in a series dealing with prospects of major league ball clubs.)

CLEARWATER, Fla., March 10—Those merry Brooklyn Dodgers started out as the year's no. one mystery team in the National Baseball League.

Maestro Casey Stengel is as much in the dark as anybody. All he knows is that he has a flock of ball players down here. He hasn't the faintest idea who'll be winners or why, when the time comes to answer the opening question.

"We're going to try one of those noble experiments," said Stengel today, "that is, we're going to toss a lot of ivory into the hopper and see what comes out."

During the winter Stengel made three big deals, involving 13 players and nearly \$80,000 in cash, with the New York Giants, Boston Bees and Newark Internationals.

Ed Brandt, southpaw, Fred Frankhouse, veteran right-hander, and outfielder Randy Moore were acquired from Boston in return for catcher Al Lopez; pitchers Ray Benge, Johnny Babich and Bobby Reis; infielder Tony Cuccinello and outfielder Gene Moore. Sam Leslie, first sacker, went to the Giants for \$20,000 and the Dodgers then gave Newark \$40,000 and outfielder Ralph Boyle and first baseman Johnny McCarthy for Buddy Hassett, one of the best looking first sackers in the minors.

Brandt and Frankhouse are figured to be regular starters along with William Watson Clark and other left hander; George Earnshaw, who is in the best shape of his career, and Van Lingle Mungo, the ace of the staff. The latter still is listed as a holdout but his early signing is regarded a certainty.

Emil Leonard, the sinker ball expert will share in the relief duties with the veteran Tom Zachary.

Most of the catching will be done by Gordon Phelps, Lopez's understudy last year. Raymond Berrie, leading catcher of the Pacific Coast League in 1935, and Walter Millies, from Chattanooga, are fighting it out for the second string berth.

### Canadiens Presented With Trophy

Hockey battles and rivalry were all forgotten last night as members of midget hockey teams gathered at the Fire Hall to wind up a highly successful season. With nearly a hundred percent attendance Canadiens were officially crowned champions as His Worship Mayor P. W. Turner presented the hands-on-the-most-valuable-player trophy to Allison MacAleer of the winning team amid thunderous applause from members of the other three teams that comprised the league.

George McLeod, brilliant young centre of the Rangers, was awarded the Chester A. Campbell trophy as the most valuable player to his team and the youngster also received an ovation. The presentations were the highlights of a gathering that wound up a highly successful season in midget hockey circles.

His Worship Mayor P. W. Turner was the first speaker of the evening. Mayor Turner expressed his pleasure at being present at the gathering. The speaker stated that he always had taken a great interest in the "kids" and was more than pleased at the success that had attended their league. He congratulated all the players on the fine brand of hockey they had played and the sportsmanship that was displayed. He stated that all the teams were a credit to their coaches, and to the city. Referee Mel Diamond's work was also praised by the speaker.

Before concluding His Worship gave some timely advice to the youngsters. Hockey, he stated, "creates teamwork and friendship but they must not forget their training for the sterner battle of life. He therefore urged the boys to attend to their school studies as well as to fit themselves for the sterner tasks that are to come."

He then presented the Col. D. A. MacKinnon Trophy to Allison MacAleer of the champion Canadiens and the trophy for the most valuable player to George McLeod of the Rangers.

Col. D. A. MacKinnon, donor of the trophy, also expressed his pleasure at being present at the function. The speaker stated that it seemed only a few weeks ago since they had formed the league. Since that time great work had been done in developing the boys' amateur hockey with the Maritime title at stake.

Royals are confident of victory. Their coach "Chick" Williams has been keeping them limbered up with daily workouts and he expects them to take good advantage of their large home ice surface to capture the two-province crown.

Winner of the Maritime finals with Amherst will meet Ottawa district winners in a best-two-of-three series on Moncton ice if either of the Maritime teams win and on Charlottetown ice if the Royals are victorious. The series will be played March 23, 25 and 27, if necessary.

### Superiors Lose To Crystals

SUMMERSIDE, P. E. I., March 10—Witnessed by a large crowd of fans that was augmented by nearly three hundred from Charlottetown, Summerside Crystals last night chalked up their third victory over Charlottetown Superiors when they defeated the visiting team 4-1 in an exhibition match played in the Crystal rink.

Summerside took a 1-0 lead during a fast first period Steele scoring on Schurman's rebound near the half way mark of the period. The play was about on a par with no penalties being handed out.

### Leafs Lose to Ameriks

NEW YORK, March 10—Coming from behind with a two goal outburst in the first frame, New York Americans defeated Toronto Maple Leafs 3-2 in a fast but clean National Hockey League match played before 9,000 fans here tonight.

The triumph practically clinched a Stanley Cup play-off berth for the winners who are now five points ahead of the fourth place Montreal Canadiens. The loss dropped Toronto to a tie with Montreal Maroons for leadership of the Canadian division.

Leafs started tonight like certain winners but were unable to score until early in the second period when big Charlie Conacher took Joe Primeau's pass at the blue line, circled the American cage, and flipped the rubber past the astonished goalkeeper Roy Worters.

Dede Klein squared matters for the star squared hand 10 minutes later by driving a low, hard shot into the Toronto net after a passing bout with Nels Stewart and Joe Jerwa. Then Conacher came through with his second goal on passes from Buzz Boll and Bill Thoms.

### Maroons Deadlocked With Leafs In Canadian Section; Bruins Defeats Wings 1-0

MONTRÉAL, March 10—Montreal Maroons and New York Rangers fought through 70 minutes of hard-hitting hockey to a scoreless tie tonight in a National Hockey League game that reached its fastest pace in the overtime as both teams tried hard for a victory.

Rangers lost ground in their battle for a play-off berth as Boston's victory over Detroit increased Bruins' third-place margin in the league's American section to three points over the last-place Blue Shirts. The one point earned by Maroons in their tie sent them into a first-place deadlock with Toronto in the Canadian division.

Maroons had a wide margin of play in the first period but Rangers took the edge in the robustly played second that saw Lionel Conacher and Art Coulter exchange blows with gloves off. Conacher, checked along the boards by Murray Murdoch was wrestling with him when Coulter went to Murdoch's aid.

Conacher promptly threw his fists at the newcomer and several punches were exchanged before both went off with majors.

It looked as though the players on the ice would join in the battle but none of these on the bench made a move as under the penalty enacted league ruling a fine of \$50 faced any player leaving the bench to join a fight. Hooley Smith also drew a major for high-sticking Otto Heller in the same period while Heller went off with a minor.

Bun Cook made his appearance on the New York line-up for the first time since December and turned in a good effort for the short time he was used. He played center on the top line with younger Ranger players.

### Primrose Club Defaults To Montreal Team
