THE LOVELY WEATHER ENJOYED IN FRANCE

The following letter has been received by Mrs. Joseph Deagle of Rollo Bay from her brother James who is at the front:

France,
March 19th, 1916.
Dear Sister Sophia:— Your ever welcome letter to hand yesterday was glad to hear you were all well as this leaves me at present.

I am now resting at our billets for a few days after coming out of the Trenches. I got rid of the cold after having it so long as the open air seems to have driven it out of my system. As you say the marches are often pretty hard, walking and carrying our pack, but after getting out and taking things easy for a few days we seem to forget all about it and are soon ready for another for as long as our feet keeps good and mine have been pretty tuff so far thank God, everything is fine.

There have only been a couple of our men killed and a few hurt so far. I cannot describe much about the war in a letter because it is forbidden but it is an awful experience to go through and will be long remembered by us all.

Today is Sunday but I didn't get to mass as I am on Guard. There is lots of churches handy everywhere we move and I go whenever possible. We have just been given our share of tobacco and we make sure to be on time for that or else some greedy ones might get it all.

The weather is lovely and mild like in June at home and some days one would hardly imagine there is war at all among those beautiful fields, except for the boom of big guns that can be heard all over the distance.

I write to you all as often as I get a chance but the answer takes a long time coming as we move so much and often the mail is delayed in England for some reason or other, but please answer as soon as you get one from me.

We get free paper and envelopes, once or twice a week. You can always address my letters to London, P. O. with my Battalion Number as usual.

I must close now and fall in for a little practice. With best love to all and in hopes of being remembered in your prayers, I remain your affectionate brother

RESEMBLED A TRANSPORT, THEREFORE SANK SUSSEX.

BERLIN, April 9.—A fourth American inquiry was added to-day to others awaiting reply at the Foreign Office when the American Embassy requested information regarding the steamer Eagle Point, recently sunk off Queenstown, and asked whether she was destroyed by a German submarine. The Foreign Office states that as yet it has no information from the Admiralty regarding the Sussex, the Englishman, the Manchester Engineer or the Eagle Point.

The Admiralty has countered the question regarding the Sussex with a request for more exact details on the time, place and circumstances of the Sussex disaster. No suggestions or possible explanations covering the case of the Sussex have been advanced in authoritative circles either at the Foreign Office or at the Admiralty. Only one supposition is heard in unofficial circles to account for the incident in case it should develop that a German submarine is concerned, and that is that the Sussex in build resembled a transport or a cruiser.

Another possible explanation is that the Sussex was taking a route used largely for the conveyance of troops.

HUNS COUNTING TAME RABBITS FOR FOOD
BERLIN, April 11.—Maximum meat prices and the amount of meat to be allotted daily in the future to each individual, and the manner of distribution will be agreed upon to-morrow, when representatives of all the greater Berlin municipalities gather for a discussion of the food problem. A decision, however, may have to be contingent on a census of the existing live stock in the empire, which begins next Saturday. The census will include horses, cattle, sheep, hogs, goats, tame rabbits and poultry. Counters from each municipality will be appointed to take the census.
