That Car Of Yours. By WILLIAM ULLMAN. Heart-to-Heart Talks With Automobile Owners and Drivers on How to Get the Most Out of Their Cars at the Least Expense.

DON'T BE TOO FEARFUL. So much has been written cautioning car owners against excessive use of the choke that some motorists lean over backward in this respect.

STEER WITH THE SKID. Regardless of how wrong it seems or how firmly instinct argues against it, the way to break a skid is to steer with it.

SPARE CHAIN IS HANDY. "The more, the merrier" applies to skid chains. Motorists who have dismounted from a warm car to change a flat tire and then have had also to change a chain from one tire to another never will question the point.

REMOVE BATTERY FIRST. If the car is to be stored for the winter, the battery should be removed and placed in a battery shop where it will be given regular attention.

THERE'S A BIG DIFFERENCE. Oil filters that keep the crankcase lubricant in good condition for from 1,500 to 2,000 miles or more during warm weather are not so efficient in winter, when gasoline and other diluents seep into the lubricant.

WATER CAUSES TROUBLE. There is not so much dust in the air to creep into the gasoline and stop up the gasoline tank fuel line or the carburetor.

FLUSH OFF THE ALCOHOL. Alcohol is one of the few substances that is harmful to the nitrocellulose finishes so generally used today.
