By James L. Barton, M.D. SAVING BABIES LIVES BY DEXTROSE

One of the sad sights of former years was the infant with such severe indigestion that it was unable to retain anything on its stomach.

So if your youngster or other member of the family is ill, and food by mouth cannot or should not be taken, and your doctor informs you that he must make these injections into the thigh muscles, you will know that everything possible is being done for your loved one.

CANADA'S NATIONAL WEALTH

Q. What is the national wealth of Canada?

A. A new estimate of the national wealth of Canada places the sum at \$26,691,482,000, for 1926, which showed an increase of a billion dollars over the previous year, and which represents a per capita wealth of \$2,842.

In the period since the War, Canada has been absorbing an even larger proportion of her own securities, and during the first six months of 1929 of all government, municipal, corporation and railroad bonds sold in the Dominion took over 60 per cent.

Last year at this time the crop was estimated at 107 percent of the acres from 28,158,505 in 1928. The bureau's estimate that the crop rates only 66 percent of the ten year average is far below last year's high estimate at this time, but it is rather more encouraging than a number of recent estimates from the west.

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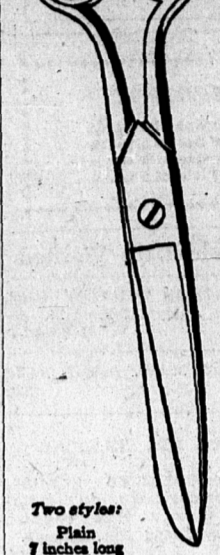
