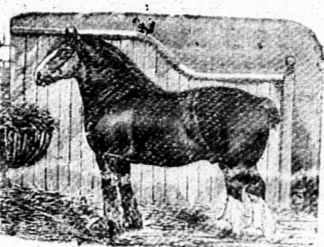

The church was filled to its utmost capacity, and each one present felt it was good to be there, as seldom such a treat is given.

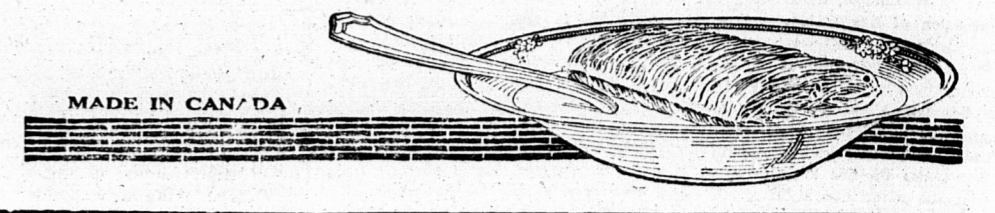

Registration of Motor Vehicles Owners of motor vehicles, chauffeurs and others are reminded that permits and licenses under "The Motor Vehicle Law" of this Province, expire on the 1st May. Applications for registration for the current year, whether cars previously registered or not, should be made at once on the revised forms furnished by the Provincial Secretary, Charlottetown. The annual tax and war tax and fees is as follows:

MOTOR VEHICLES Annual Tax—(Including War Tax) 60 cents per 100 lbs. weight. The fractional part of 100 lbs. over 49 lbs. charged for as 100 lbs.. 49 lbs. and under not charged for. Registration fee—1st year \$5. Second year as owner of car \$2. Markers—\$1.25 per set. Old markers to be returned.

MOTOR TRUCKS Annual Tax—One ton capacity \$10. Every additional ton capacity or small fraction thereof \$5 extra. War Tax—One-third of annual tax to be added. Registration fee—1st year \$5. Second year as owner of car \$2. Markers—\$1.25 per set. Old markers to be returned.

MOTOR CYCLES Annual Tax—\$5. War Tax \$1.67. Annual registration fee \$2. Markers \$1.25. Total annually \$9.92

DEALERS LICENSES Annual tax—(Including one set of markers) \$20. War tax \$6.67. Registration fee \$5.00. Total annually \$31.67. Additional Dealers Markers per set \$2.00.

CHAUFFEURS Annual tax—\$2. War tax 67 cents. Annual registration fee \$2. Badge 60 cents. Total \$5.17. 5391-5-1 M Thu satue 7 1
