Her cargo included five cars of hay, one of molasses, one of rolled oats, one of flour, one of seed, one of rope, and two cars of way freight. The Stanley also reached Pictou before noon.

Mrs. Steele is in poor health and there are several small children. The family are said to be very decent people and the calamity that has come upon them is dreadful. The committee of Council whose duty it is to care for such cases, have the family in charge and what should be done for them will be done.—New Glasgow Chronicle.
