BRITISH SHIPBUILDERS WILL SOON ERECT BIG PLANT.

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.—It is understood that negotiations with the British shipbuilders are reaching such a point that the Government will shortly be able to announce that arrangements have been made with Harland & Wolff or with Vickers Sons & Maxim for the establishment of the Atlantic Coast of the largest shipbuilding plant and drydock on the continent.

The location of the enterprise will, of course, largely depend upon the British firm, but it is understood that Montreal, Halifax and St. John are all under consideration.

There is a representative of a Victoria syndicate here negotiating for the establishment of a shipbuilding plant at the city of Victoria.

INTOXICATED MAN LEAPED INTO ATLANTIC.

HALIFAX, Feb. 28.—The Allan liner Corsican arrived here last evening with one passenger less than she started from Liverpool with. When two days from Liverpool, Joseph Taylor, a steamer passenger, leaped through a port hole and ended his life. Taylor had been drinking.

ANARCHY MIGHT REIGN IN KING GEORGE'S STRAIT

VIENNA, Feb. 27.—Emperor Franz Josef today ordered the Austrian Minister at Athens to urge King George not to abdicate, believing that the downfall of the present Greek regime would precipitate a reign of anarchy.

The concentration of Bulgarian troops along the Turkish frontier is attributed here to the belief on Bulgaria's part that the overthrow of King George is inevitable, and that when it comes Turkey and Greece will become involved. Bulgaria plans to take advantage of this by seizing Macedonia.

Bulgaria has between 40,000 and 50,000 troops concentrated near Kostendil, only three hours' march from the Turkish border.

BUDDHIST POPE BARELY ESCAPED.

CALCUTTA, British India, Feb. 27.—The Dalai Lama, the supreme head of the Lamaist Hierarchy, who fled from Lhasa, the capital of Tibet, upon the approach of the Chinese troops, has made good his escape to Sikkim, a state of India to the south of Tibet, and adjoining Darjeeling, the British district, in which latter place the fugitive will seek an asylum.

The escape of Dalai Lama was a narrow one, for Chinese troops bent upon his capture, hotly pursued him to the borders of Sikkim. The Tibetan pope travelled day and night and at one of the numerous ferries the Chinese overtook the Tibetan party. His followers, however, engaged their pursuers, thus permitting time of Dalai Lama to reach the frontier, but few of his party was left to him when he crossed into Sikkim.

LONDON, Feb. 27.—No information has reached the British Government as to how the Tibetan crisis was precipitated but strict orders have been sent to the British agent at Gyantze and to the agents at the other British posts in Tibet to observe strict neutrality.

It is understood that similar instructions have been forwarded to British officials in India.

The advance guard of the Chinese mounted infantry entered Lhasa on Feb. 17, and the Dalai Lama fled that night. He expected to reach Darjeeling next Sunday. According to advices received by the foreign office, the Buddhist pope was accompanied by three ministers and 160 other men.

The Tibetan situation came up in the House of Lords today. Lord Morley, secretary of state for India, said: "The Government has opened communications with the Chinese Government in regard to the unexpected and interesting situation, but nothing has developed yet."

Meanwhile strict neutrality will be observed. The Dalai Lama will be invited to occupy the Warren Hastings house in Calcutta, and be treated with courtesy and respect due to a ruler of high spiritual authority and the object of veneration to many millions of His Majesty's subjects. The only word received from the Dalai Lama since he quitted Lhasa was to the effect that he was proceeding to India to consult with the British Government to which he looked for protection, and gave no indication of the cause of his flight, except that the people of Lhasa have been greatly oppressed by the Chinese.
