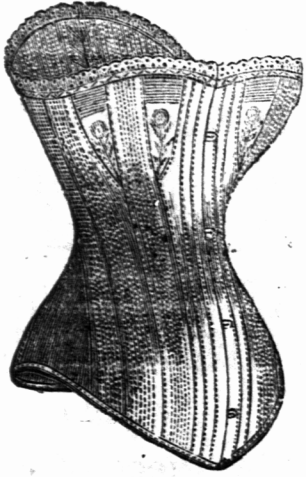

PASSENGERS by the Stanley yesterday en route to this city, engaged a special train which brought them here at 8.10 p. m.

The Stanley arrived in Georgetown, at 10.45 o'clock, yesterday morning and leaves this morning at 7, on return to Pictou.

Mr. E. H. Duchemin, who has been on a short business trip to New Brunswick and Nova Scotia in the interests of the Bee Hive lumber yard, returned home yesterday via the Stanley.

Her funeral took place on the 9th inst, to Kinkora, where a Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. J. J. McDonald.

They will have a special programme of choice selections for this occasion and the ice being in good condition an evening's enjoyment is assured.

THE farmers of Freetown and the surrounding country are making a move towards establishing a butter factory at Freetown station. At a meeting held there on Saturday they received from Mr. Ronald Campbell of Summerside, a statement of his experience in butter making. Mr Campbell made them an offer to run a separator at Freetown and manufacture their butter for 3 1/2 cents per pound if the farmers would guarantee him 5,000 lbs of milk a day. On his offer to find the land, building and all the necessary plant to run the factory it was decided that he should have their hearty support. The following directors were appointed to canvass the farmers for milk and manage the running of the factory:—R. B. Auld, Alexander Cairns, H. J. Campbell, David Arbing, and Bruce Taylor. It was proposed to erect the factory on the corner of C. Cairns' land. Several took part in addressing the meeting.

BAD ACCIDENT

Young Man has His Leg Cut of.

Henry Byers of Charlottetown Falls into the Drum of a Threshing Machine.

A young lad named Henry Byers, 15 years of age, son of Benjamin Byers of this city met with a serious accident while at work tramping straw in the barn of Mr. Benj. Dockendorf, North River yesterday afternoon. He for mere amusement turned a summersault on the loft and accidentally fell down into the drum of the thrasher.

Mr Dockendorf was feeding the machine and as quickly as possible pulled the unfortunate young man from his perilous position but not before his right leg was wrenched off between the ankle and the knee, the lower part of the limb being thrown about ten or twelve feet from the machine.

Dr Kelly was hastily summoned and when he arrived found the boy in an exhausted condition. Securing the bleeding and after administering restoratives he had him at once removed to the Charlottetown Hospital where, owing to the mutilated condition of the flesh and bone he found it necessary to amputate the leg a few inches below the knee.

At latest reports last night he was doing nicely.
