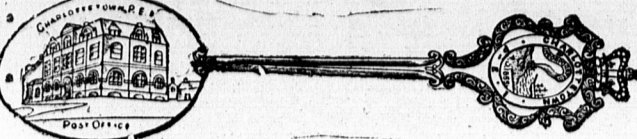

The survey of the Elmira Branch Railway will be completed this week and tenders will be called for the construction of the work. The line will be about nine miles in length and run part of the way through a wooded section of country. There will be three large cuttings over as many streams, but no very deep cuttings. At a place called Fountain Head there is one of the best springs on the whole P. E. I. This will be found of great value in furnishing water for the engines. There will probably be five stations. Harmony, Elmira, Baltic Road, Fountain Head and another point. The Elmira line will follow comparatively easy grades. It will have few curves, and for a distance of five miles the road will be absolutely straight.

Rev. Dr. D. J. Fraser preached in Zion church Sunday morning and in St. James church in the evening. Dr. Fraser occupies a professional chair in the Presbyterian College of Montreal. His sermons, fresh, clear, vigorous and timely, were heard with great appreciation by both audiences. 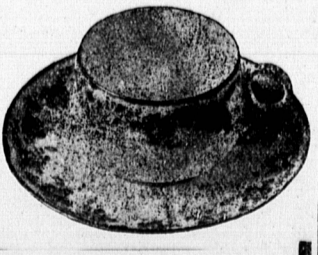
