DREYFUS.

It is thought that the division of the judges in the Rennes court martial, five to two against Dreyfus, represents fairly the proportion of the people of France who respectively believe the prisoner guilty or innocent. Indeed it has been frequently stated in Parisian newspapers that the only persons in favor of Dreyfus are Protestants, Jews and Masons.

The fact that two of his judges stood in his favor had the effect to reduce the term of his sentence. Had the court been unanimously against him the sentence could not have been less than twenty years.

The Debats states that the prisoner will serve the full term of his sentence, if he live so long, at the fortress of Corte, in the Island of Corsica. It is expected that he will be humanely treated.

Strange to say the question has arisen whether the sentence of ten years' imprisonment does or does not include the five years which Dreyfus has already served. The new sentence carries with it degradation from his position as an army officer. There appears to be a doubt whether or not the prisoner will again be publicly stripped of his uniform as he was in 1894.

It is extremely difficult for persons accustomed only to English courts and methods, to understand what were the "extenuating circumstances" which were mentioned in the verdict. It is now stated that the majority of the judges believed in the story that Dreyfus had confessed to Captain Lebrun Reynault, in which confession he was reported as saying that he gave unimportant documents with the object of getting more important information in return. This object was admitted as an extenuation of his alleged crime.

The general view in England and America has been so strongly in favor of Dreyfus that it is a little surprising to read in the correspondence of Mr. Stevens of the London Daily Mail—a very capable and fair-minded writer—that the members of the court-martial conducted the trial in a fair and impartial manner, and that the evidence was such as to make a verdict either way possible.

Very possibly both the people of France and the people of English speaking and German-speaking countries have been respectively misled, just as the readers of party-political journal in our own country are biased in political matters, by reading partial and one-sided accounts of the matters brought before them. The mass of the French people have had brought before them the facts and arguments that tell against Dreyfus. The outside world has had mainly another set of facts and arguments, and have naturally formed different opinions.

And it is not in Great Britain and America alone, but in Germany, Austria, Italy and even in Russia that a most unfavorable opinion of French justice and of the French people has been formed in connection with the Dreyfus case. The confidence of the world in the political and judicial institutions of France has been shaken. And yet it may be that Dreyfus is not a wholly innocent man. He is undoubtedly the victim of a conspiracy, and has been hounded down by men who are dyed in villany, but it is possible that the verdict of history may be somewhat between that at which the court-martial has arrived and the decision generally reached by the public in countries outside of France.

Before sailing for home Hon J. I. Tarte gave an expression of his views on the Transvaal situation. He declares the position of the Boers to be altogether untenable and thinks the Outlanders must be given the franchise. "What," he says, "would happen if a colony of French Canadians in the Northwest were refused the privilege of voting? They would be up in arms at once, and rightly so." It is to be seen that Mr Tarte is quite in accord with the British policy in South Africa. And certainly Canada was never more British in sentiment than it is to-day.

The Local Government of Quebec held a political picnic at Ile-au Noix the other day at which many of the prominent Liberals of the Province were present. Premier Marchand, Sir Henry Joly, and several of Mr. Marchand's colleagues in the Government were among the speakers. The financial condition of the Province was a salient feature in the discussion. By general consent Premier Marchand has accomplished great things in restoring the equilibrium between revenue and expenditure. This year he claims a genuine surplus of \$23,000, as against a deficit of \$800,000 two years ago. He further claims that with the same sources of revenue as his predecessors had the surplus would have reached \$400,000. No doubt these claims would be discounted by his political opponents, but after making due allowance there can remain no doubt that the almost hopeless finances of Quebec have been wonderfully improved by the application of a rigid economy.

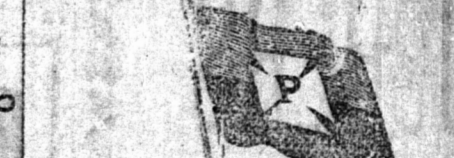
