The H. M. S. Cornwall arrived in port yesterday afternoon at three forty-five and anchored in the harbor.

The City market was well attended yesterday and much produce was moving. The pork market is steady at ten cents a lb.

P. E. I. Exhibitors made a grand showing in the Agriculture department of the Halifax Exhibition. The following were prize winners—Robere Drake, Cornwall, a first for wheat seed; A. E. McLean, Southwest, Lot 16, 3rd in same class, 1st and 2nd in barley and two firsts in oats. Peter Brodie, York, won a first each in barley and oats and Cornelius McLellan, Arlington, won a second each in barley and oats. In garden vegetables B. A. Mellett, Little York, won third in turnips.

The many friends of A. J. Hale will be pleased to know that he is able to resume business again after his recent indisposition. Mr. Hale returned from the west over a month ago—having spent the last two years in Spokane—where, about six months ago, his health became impaired. Island colony, all of whom seemed well pleased with their new surroundings. The west throughout is developing rapidly and settlers are arriving at the different points by every train. Mr. Hale will remain here for the winter and will probably return west again next spring. He has seen a lot of life in the west—having travelled as far south as San Francisco, and visited most of the important centres on both the Canadian and American sides of the line. In the past few years he has made a number of trips west making return trips across the continent four times.

A despatch from North Sydney says: Word was received here by the police department this evening that the man Callahan who is accused of stealing a sum of money from the schooner Shamrock, the property of Captain Straight, of Victoria, P. E. I., was duly arrested in St. John's on the arrival of the train on Saturday. He will be sent back for trial. Callahan, it appears, had been in jail previous to the robbery, and the police anxious to keep him secured a position for him on board the schooner Blanche which was then anchored in the stream. After being liberated from jail, the police say, Callahan went to the water front and borrowed a dory to go on board his vessel. Instead of doing this, however, he went on board the Shamrock and finding no person in the cabin, he took possession of the captain's trunk, which he opened in the dory. Yesterday morning, a number of articles that Captain Straight identified as having been in the trunk, were found in the bottom of the dory, but no trace of the sailor could be found, although a diligent search was made for him. The police believe that the man left the town the night he committed the theft, and took passage either on the Bruce or the midnight train. All the papers belonging to the Shamrock are among the articles stolen.

RUBBERING TO SOME PURPOSE.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Oct. 14—Another new star has been discovered by Mrs. Fleming of the Harvard College Observatory, according to an announcement made by Prof. Edward C. Pickering of the Observatory to-night. There have been only 16 new stars found during the last twenty-five years and of these thirteen have been discovered by the women assistants of the Observatory.

The new star whose approximate position is: right ascension 16 hours 31 minutes, 4 seconds; declination 52 hours, 10 minutes, 6 seconds was discovered by Mrs. Fleming in the constellation Ara on October 13, 1910. It appears on 21 photographs taken at Aroquipa with the 8 inch Bache and one inch Cook telescopes between July 1, and Aug. 1, 1910. The magnitude has been estimated as varying from 6.0 to 10.0 between these dates. The spectrum is quite faint. Apparently this object had passed into a nebulous condition before its spectrum was photographed.

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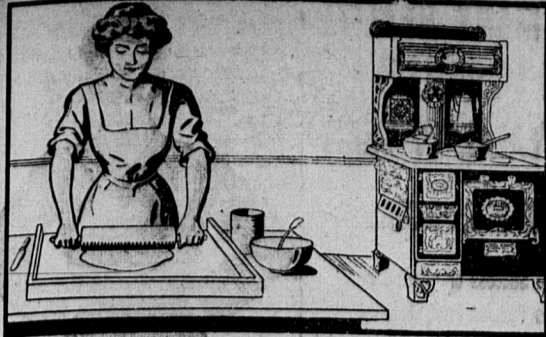
