

..*EGG CIRCLE.—The annual meeting of the New London North Egg Circle, No. 21, was held in the Long River Hall on February 4th, with the President, Mr. J. Bradford Millman, in the chair. The report of the secretary-treasurer showed the circle to be in a good financial standing. Mr. Alex. H. Campbell, the manager, submitted the following report which is a summary of 11 months work from March 1st, 1915, to Feb. 1st, 1916:—Eggs were furnished by 92 members; total number of dozens shipped, 38,531; total cash received, \$7,757.18; cash divided among members, \$7,337.70; divided as follows: selects, 35,508 doz., No. 2's, 1,961 doz.; bad eggs, 61 doz.; average price received for selects, 20.20 cents per doz.; average price received for No. 2's, 19.21 cents per doz.; collected in winter months, 557 doz. The following Directors were appointed for the ensuing year:—J. Bradford Millman, Elphinstone Howatt, Chas. S. McKay, John Bernard, Wm. Proffitt, Wm. H. Campbell and Oscar Johnstone; Messrs John Johnstone and John A. Millman were appointed auditors. The delegates appointed to attend the Central Association are Elphinstone Howatt and Howard MacLeod. Mr. William Kerr being present, addressed the meeting, giving some valuable information regarding the work of the industry.

..*RUSHING THE WORK.—The barracks for the soldiers in Souris is rapidly nearing completion. The carpenters have finished their work and the plumbing of the building will be completed by the end of the week. The two upper storeys are given over to sleeping quarters for the men, each room being fitted with bunks, the larger rooms accommodating ten or twelve men, the smaller ones six or eight. The ground floor is arranged to contain the kitchen and pantry, two mess rooms, guardroom and officers' quarters, while the toilet and shower baths are in the basement. The water system is controlled by a two h.p. gasoline engine and force pump which conveys the water to the parts of the building necessary. Stoves placed at different points in the corridors give a uniform heat all over the building, which although very roomy is yet one of the most comfortable barracks on P. E. Island.—
