So much has been heard of late about Mrs. Carrie Nation and her saloon-smashing hatchet that it has brought both her and her husband into notoriety. The New York World publishes what purports to be an interview with Mr. Nation in which he tells that he married his wife, then a widow, because she possessed stern qualities and could manage things with energy and economy. They went to Texas and there accumulated \$200,000, largely due to Mrs. Nation. But Carrie was difficult to manage. She told him the reason she smashed saloons was because her first husband died a drunkard and she feared he would meet the same fate. This made him angry. When a cyclone struck the place Mrs. N. used to go out in the back yard and pray that it would clean out every saloon in the town. Once she asked him to make a speech at a meeting, and just as he began to get warmed up she called out to him, "Now, papa, you had better quit and run for the train, I want you to go back home and take care of the place while I am away." It would seem from all this that in the Nation family "the grey mare is considerably the better horse."

The British postal authorities are now considering the adoption of two innovations which have been tried in India with success. One of these is the delivery of parcels and packages by carriers C. O. D. the carriers collecting the value and remitting it to the sender. Over 2,500,000 packages were handled in that way by the Indian post office last year at a paying rate of about six cents each. The second innovation proposed is the paying of money orders by the letter carriers. When the carrier delivers a money order at the residence of a citizen, he will, if the latter desires, cash the order on the spot. So the postal improvements move on while we do not think it worth while to have letter carriers in Charlottetown.

His chief deputy, the Rev. Henry T. Skillings, has resigned. It is said that the resignations are due to the influence of politicians who fear the result of the "dry" city on future party success.

The Lancet has an article on the comparative demerits of mud and dust. One may be about as disagreeable as the other, while the mud is comparatively harmless and the dust is the vehicle for diseases of all kinds, including the most fatal ones. The moral which the Lancet finds is that the street sprinkler is of very important sanitary value.

Nantucket Island, Mass. has had an experience not unlike that of P. E. Island, being shut off from all communication with the mainland, except by telegraph, for six days. The harbor is frozen up and they have no winter steamers or ice boats down there.
