"I promised," continued Mr. MacDonald, "to make good to my hon. friend from Rustico my statement, and I have now proved that what I was saying is correct." (Applause).

Discussing prohibition Mr. MacDonald said he had also promised to answer a certain statement of the Rustico member. He had a letter in this connection which he intended to read, but in Mr. LePage's absence he would not do so, as he did not desire to take an unfair advantage. Answering Liberal criticism of Jail discipline, Mr. MacDonald pointed out that under the Liberals the prisoners had escaped. The difference was that under the Conservatives they were caught and sent to Penitentiary.

Mr. MacDonald: "The land tax?" Mr. LePage: "Yes." Mr. MacDonald: "And my hon. friend from Rustico wanted to give them 40 per cent." Mr. LePage: "Oh no." Mr. MacDonald: "That was in the councils of the Liberal party." Mr. LePage: "I should know." Mr. MacDonald: "That was what my hon. friend from Rustico says, and he should know."

Mr. MacDonald agreed with the Opposition leader that nothing would be gained by this Province entering a Maritime Union. We have a better agricultural Province than either Nova Scotia or New Brunswick and by joining the others we would be losing a great deal. He did not think the people of this Province would tolerate such a proposition.

Mr. MacDonald regretted that the hon. member from Rustico (Mr. LePage) was not in his seat. Mr. MacDonald had referred to certain rights of way that the Rustico member had purchased just previous to the last provincial election and he had been challenged by Mr. LePage to prove his statement. "I could not prove it at the time, but I am in a position to prove it now," he declared.

Mr. Speaker: "I call your attention, Mr. Speaker, to the fact that the hon. gentleman is out of order in replying to any argument used in the Draft Address debate."

Mr. MacDonald: "Then I will have permission to make a statement, as I submit that I have a perfect right to do. Five rights of way were purchased through the influence of the member from Rustico previous to the last provincial election."

(Mr. MacDonald then gave the statement of rights of way purchased at Grand Pier Point in July, 1931, just previous to the election of August 6, which are detailed at the beginning of this article.)

### Cubs' Outfielder Fractures Leg

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 29.—(A.P.)—Chicago's chances of retaining the National Baseball League pennant received a severe blow today when Hazen (Kiki) Cuyler, one of the finest outfielders in the senior circuit, suffered a fracture of his right leg while attempting to steal second base in an exhibition game with Hollywood.

The accident happened in the fourth inning of the contest, which the Cubs won 10-8. Kiki hesitated a moment as he approached the bag and then decided to hit the dirt. He was half a step too late in his decision, and his foot caught in the bag, giving his leg a sharp twist. He was carried from the field.

Examination at hospital showed what doctors termed a "conminuted fracture of the end of the fibula", the smaller bone three inches in length had been severed from the main bone.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 29.—(A.P.)—The United States Congress responded with alacrity today to a succinct message by President Roosevelt asking drastic federal regulation of new security issues.

criticism" on this subject. Mr. MacDonald could not see that this criticism was fair.

Legal members of the Legislature frequently are called upon to give up their spare time, even on holidays, to the interests of their constituents. Why deny, because he is a lawyer, the privilege of dealing with the Government in the same way in which the president of a corporation can deal through his corporation, with the Government? There was no reason why farmer members should not have the same privilege, Mr. MacDonald believed.

Mr. Allen: "Why did you not include the farmers in your bill?" Mr. MacDonald: "Because the farmers were not concerned in the measure. The Crown Prosecutors must have knowledge of law."

Mr. Cox had contended that \$16,000 had been spent by the Government on new appointments but he had failed, Mr. MacDonald said, to produce figures. The figures he had given did not correspond with his statement.

Evidences of Economy "Do my hon. friends know," said Mr. MacDonald, "that the three Crown Prosecutors are not costing this Government as much as the sole gentleman that acted as Provincial Magistrate under the Liberal administration?" The speaker showed that Mr. George Tweedy had received \$1800 annually for his services; and he did the work chiefly on Saturday afternoons. The three Crown Prosecutors today are receiving less than Mr. Tweedy had received.

The Opposition had contended that the saving in expenses at Fallwood was made by reason of the amount of coal left in the institution by the Liberals. Mr. MacDonald pointed out that the coal bill was practically the same from year to year.

A reduction from \$14,000 to \$6,500 had been made in groceries as compared with the cost under Liberal rule. This reduction could not be accounted for altogether by reason of decline in prices, and must be attributed to better methods of economy. Other savings in supplies to jails, etc. were cited. The records showed that in every department the Purchasing Agent had asked for tenders, and had accepted the lowest tender.

Mr. McIntyre: "Do the Liberal coal dealers tender?" Mr. MacDonald: "I suppose they do."

Mr. McIntyre: "I don't think they do." Mr. MacDonald: "Did the Conservatives tender when the Liberals were in power?" Mr. McIntyre: "I don't know." (Laughter).

Mr. MacDonald: "Perhaps there is an agreement between them." In conclusion Mr. MacDonald said he had every reason to believe, notwithstanding the depression and the difficult times through which this Province along with the rest of the world, is passing, that Prince Edward Island will "win out" to contentment and prosperity.

## Moncton Hawks Lose First Tilt To Ont. Titlists

### O. H. A. Champions Outskate "Hub" Team To Grab One Goal Lead In First Game Of Series Winning From Maritimers 1-0—Final Tilt Friday Night.

TORONTO, March 29.—Niagara Falls, Ontario Hockey Association titlists, will carry a one-goal lead into the second game of the Allan Cup semi-finals as a result of their 1-0 victory over Moncton Hawks, Maritime champions in the first game tonight. The second of the two-game, total-goal series, will be played here Friday.

TORONTO, March 29.—(C.P.)—Moncton Hawks, a Maritime hockey force credited with carrying more power than any Allan Cup aspirant from the Eastern Seaboard ever brought to the playdown wars, faced Niagara Falls Cataracts here tonight in the first of a two-game series to decide the east's senior champions.

The teams play the second game of the total-goal series here Friday night.

### PLAY BY PERIODS

#### First Period

The game started 15 minutes late with neither team making a serious effort at combination play. Muckle got in the first shot, a low drive from the right boards. Cataracts rushed dangerously, Hastie leading the attack till McDonald broke up a three-man Falls assault and raced around the Niagara defence. He pulled Esseltine out of position but was checked before he could shoot.

#### Kaminsky Scores For Falls

Goalie Foster turned aside long range shots from Shannon and Kaminsky before the Niagara Falls winger beat him on a solo rush. Kaminsky skated around Walker on Moncton's defence and fired a low shot that caught the corner of the net.

#### Foster Brilliant

Faster skaters, Cataracts checked furiously as they stormed back for more goals after stopping every Moncton thrust. Foster made a great save when Steele was in on top of him. The goalie had another good save from Kaminsky.

Hunter and Connolly started to throw cross-checks at each other and both were penalized. The pace slowed down while they were off but even so, Foster had to move fast to kick out Kaminsky's shot. Then Kalbfleisch was waved off for charging McDonald and the Hawks swooped down on Esseltine. Webster and Miller jabbed the rubber at the Cataract goalie without success before the period ended.

#### Second Period

Until Kalbfleisch had finished serving out his time, the game dragged. Cataracts opened up when he came back, Kaminsky and Hastie driving in on Foster.

#### Hawks Force Play

But the tables turned suddenly when Lauzon was sentenced for tripping Connolly. McManus missed an open net on Connolly's pass and James bounced a hot one off Esseltine's pads. Walker skated through the whole Niagara Falls team, passing to Muckle who slashed the puck inches wide of the net.

Cataracts remained in hot water while Peterkin spent an enforced rest for boarding Irvine. Irvine and McDonald combined on two rushes and the two got cheers for some classical puck ragging.

Still outskated but no longer outplayed, the Hawks hurled assault after assault at the Falls defence. Connolly and McDonald rocked Esseltine with stinging shots and McManus was wide from close range.

Lauzon got another penalty for charging but McDonald dumped Kalbfleisch and the sides were both short-handed.

#### Walker Nearly Scores

Miller and Peterkin joined the parade as tempers became raw but neither team could score before the period closed, though Walker circled the Falls rear-guard and almost

dribbled a soft shot over the netman's stick.

### THIRD PERIOD

Peterkin gave Hawks an edge in man power again by tripping Miller. But Gill got one a few seconds later for a similar offence. Hastie and Kaminsky burst in on Foster in succession with booming shots.

When McManus was through the Niagara Falls defence alone Kalbfleisch saved a goal by pulling his feet from under him.

The Cataract defenceman drew a penalty. Hastie raced right up to Foster's door step to bang a back header on the goalie's pads. Irvine drove right back with a terrific shot from the defence that staggered Esseltine.

There was more ragging but little action when Bowman went to the cooler for a trip offence.

### Muckle Misses Easy Scoring Chance

Muckle completely missed a pass in front of the Niagara Falls net from Irvine and threw away an easy scoring chance.

Gill sent Shannon spinning when the Cataract speedster tried to beat the Hawk defence alone. The Maritime team attacked in earnest when Kalbfleisch drew his second penalty of the period. Connolly, James and Webster swarmed around Esseltine, throwing rubber at him from all directions, but the Falls fort held till the defence star returned.

The checking was too tight for either squad to make much headway in the last two minutes.

## ALL MARITIME TEAM MAY TOUR EUROPE

### The Season Of 1934 May See An All Maritime Team In Europe Should Permission Be Granted By C. A. H. A.

(Canadian Press)

AMHERST, N. S., March 29.—An all-Maritime hockey team will tour Europe next year if permission is granted by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association at its coming annual meeting in Vancouver.

Announcement was made to this effect tonight by President James Wry, of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association, who leaves Thursday for the meeting. He was unable to state whether the selection would be made from the Big Three League or from all Maritime teams.

President Wry declared that this recognition was to have been accorded the Maritimes this year but that the puck-chasers from the eastern provinces had been forced to forego the trip owing to conditions abroad.

The Association head announced tonight also that he proposed to extend the C. A. H. A. the hospitality of Maritime rinks for the Allan Cup finals of 1934.

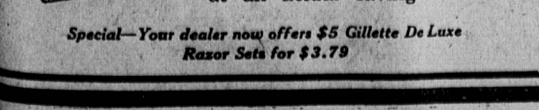
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
