—The latest news, first of all.

—Another silver grey fox came from the west yesterday and was forwarded to Brooklyn, N. Y.

—Miss May Murphy, Conway, left yesterday for Calgary where she has secured a position as stenographer.

—There were two hundred passengers going outwards from Summerside by the Empress yesterday and fifty returning.

—Geo. Robison, Summerside, has commenced grading new wheat and oats. He reports that both wheat and oats are of a good quality.

—Earl Grady, Celon Rogerson, Stirling Silliphant, Eugene Adams and J. Davison of Summerside have entered for the Brace McKay Bicycle race to be held in Summerside this evening.

—Miss Evelyn Clark, Wilmont Valley, left yesterday for Moose-jaw where she intends locating. She was accompanied by her cousin Miss Alice Clark of the same place, who goes to Brandon.

—Dr. W. P. McNalley and family left yesterday on return to their home after a few weeks' visit with friends at Elmont Bay. Dr. J. E. McNalley also returned to his home, Medford, Maine, yesterday.

—The funeral of the late Mrs. Geo. Hinton, Summerside, which took place yesterday afternoon was largely attended. The pall-bearers were: Dougall S. Wright, Fred Strong, Albert Pickering, Thomas Frizel, Chas. Strong and Norman A. Wright. The Rev. Mr. Dawson officiated at the house and Rev. Mr. Johnson at the Church and grave.

—F. J. Buote, Tignish, was in Charlottetown yesterday and states that F. H. Stover proceeds to Prince County week after next to take up the work of boring for coal at or near DeBlois, where work has been going on since last May, by the DeBlois Mining and Exploring Co. Owing to the company not having adequate boring equipment they found much difficulty in proceeding with the work. When Contractor Stover's plant is brought to the scene it is hoped that the question as to whether coal exists or not will be determined without further delay.

—The Indian Head break water, Summerside Harbor, is now completed. It is a permanent structure and will remain so long after those who have been interested in its construction have passed away. It is a massive stone structure, many of the stones weighing ten tons, extending from Indian Head on the south side of Summerside Harbor to the outside of the harbor light, a distance of 3240 feet, with a block built of creosote timber at the end forming an ell of one hundred and thirty feet in length. During its construction it has been visited by hundreds of visitors and will continue to be a place of resort for those who at any time during the summer season, desire to have a boat sail in the harbor or an invigorating walk from the light-house to the shore on the solid stone promenade. It forms a fine shelter for vessels. Good anchoring is found after turning the light a little distance to the south. When a westerly gale is on and the sea is dashing against this great wall, the water on the inside of the breakwater is quite smooth. The effect of this is quite perceptible around the wharves as the sea does not rise again to its full force.

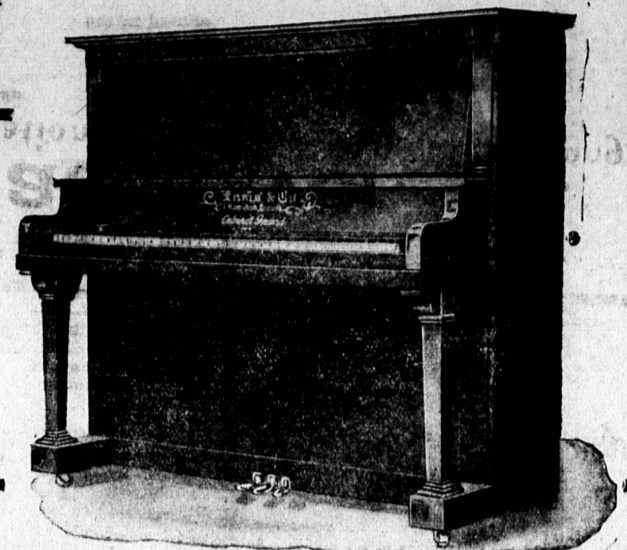

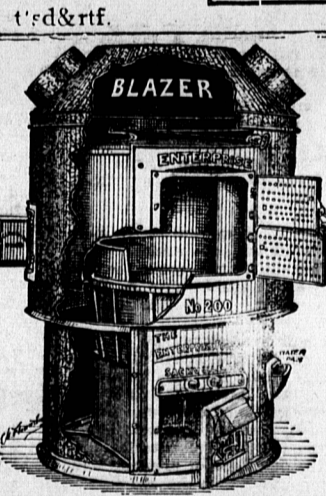
