COLONIAL TROUBLE SEC'Y NOTES LOOMS IN IMPROVEMENT MID-EUROPE

Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister Refers to Empire Trade in Address Before the Corona Club.

(Canadian Press Cable)
 LONDON, June 20.—Signs of improvement in the economic situation of the British Colonial Empire were seen by Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister, Secretary of State for the colonies, when he addressed the annual dinner of the Corona Club here. Sir Philip also referred to Japanese competition in British and colonial markets and said there was nothing hostile in the British determination to have a fair share of the British and colonial markets between themselves.
 The Corona Club, whose members are principally from the colonies or Britons connected with the colonies, has a membership now of more than 3,000. Sir Philip commented.

The improvement which he saw in the economic situation of the colonies "is partly due to our own planning and partly to the rather better turn in some markets," the Minister said. The British preferences for instance had made a great change in the colonies' prospects. On the other hand, in seven years the proportion of United Kingdom exports to the colonies had increased by more than 60 per cent.

Referring to Japanese competition Sir Philip said that duties were quite inadequate to enable British firms to meet Japanese competition on equal terms. A great body of public opinion in the colonial empire wished to secure to Britain a fair share in the colonial markets. Rt. Hon. Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Trade, had begun negotiations with the Japanese Government. But there was nothing hostile to Japan, as some elements in Japan seemed to think, in the determination of the United Kingdom and her colonies to have a fair share in each other's markets, the minister said.

Ottawa Agreements
 The combined effect of the preferences accorded in Britain by the tariff changes in the past year, and the Ottawa agreements had opened up a new era for colonial trade, Sir Philip added. He was glad to be able to record that the stimulus of the preference had encouraged wise planning and intensive research in many colonies.
 The minister also referred to recent figures of the Empire Marketing Board which showed new high records in imports from many of the colonies, notably the British West Indies.

Hitler And Hungarian Premier Confer — Austrian Premier Flies Home From London.

By Tom Wilhelm, Associated Press Staff Writer.
 BERLIN, June 20.—Archduke Otto of Hapsburg's chances of ascending the Austro-Hungarian twin throne of his forefathers had been subjected today to the crucible of mid-European politics. In a meeting Saturday between Chancellor Hitler of Germany and Premier Gombos of Hungary the matter was believed to have been considered but the result was unannounced.
 The Nazi party's Foreign Political Department issued a communique on the meeting which said: "General economic and political questions were discussed. The meeting closed with hearty assurances that both states viewed the other with greatest sympathy."
 The Hungarian Premier was feted by Dr. Alfred Rosenberg, head of the Foreign Division of the Nazi party, who returned here after being jailed for a day early this week in connection with raids on Nazis in Vienna.
 Later Gombos attended a Reichswehr (army) concert as guest of Chancellor Hitler.
 Almost simultaneously Chancellor Dollfuss of Austria alighted in a plane at Vienna from London and was greeted by the British and French ministers. Whether this diplomatic gesture was calculated to indicate to opponents of Dollfuss how Great Britain and France viewed the mid-European imbroglio could not be ascertained, but it may be observed in the light of renewed efforts to secure Otto's place on the throne and to offset the spread of Fascism.

Austrian Premier's Statement
 VIENNA, June 20.—(A.P.)—Tension between Austria and Germany over the Nazi question cannot be permanent and there is every reason to believe that present difficulties will be solved on the basis of common sense, says Chancellor Dollfuss.
 On returning to his capital Saturday night the Austrian Chancellor said that "on our side there is the sincerest willingness to smooth out the disturbed relations which are partly at least due to misunderstandings. I am confident that common sense in the end will prevail, not only in the interests of both countries but in the interest of the peaceful development of Europe."
 The chief impression that he brought back from London, where he attended the World Economic Conference, Chancellor Dollfuss added, was "the realization that Austria is not alone — this little country can count on world sympathy in its struggle for economic and political independence."
 All but a handful of over 1,000 Nazis arrested by the Austrian Government in its campaign against that party have been released as the result of a court decision.

BLACK ORGANDIE FOR EVENING WEAR
 PARIS, June 20.—Though white and pastel tones are chosen for evening gowns during the summer months, there is also a great deal of black, in organdie, chiffon, or other light-weight materials, worn. The models combining white with black for the evening seem to have the preference, such as "Tarentelle" in black chiffon with the balloon sleeves in gray black and white checked chiffon; the black crepe remain model with white crepe sleeves in the form of a bow knot; small white flowers, which has a wide belt and four cala lilies in white pique.
 We could keep on indefinitely, but that serves to convey the idea that while there are a few colors and combinations of colors considered smart, that if there is a grain of doubt in your minds, black and white will give you the stamp of fashionable approval.
