### Miss Herrington Addresses Catholic Women's League

The following is a more extended report of the C. W. L. meeting held in Rosary Hall Thursday evening, January 10th at which Miss Eleanor Herrington, Dominion Organizer, Girl Guides, delivered an address.

The meeting opened with the singing of the C. W. L. ode, "O Canada" after which a vocal solo, "Kerry Dance" was most effectively rendered by Mrs. (Dr.) Richard Ledwell, Miss Lucy Blanchard then sang in a most charming way "The Banks of Dunna" after which Mrs. F. J. Casey, the President of the C. W. L. Division introduced the speaker of the evening, Miss Eleanor Herrington, expressing the pleasure of the members and visitors in having the ideals of Guiding explained by one who had not only the actual knowledge of the Movement but the practical experience of Guiding work as well.

Miss Herrington stated her talk would be along somewhat different lines than that of the previous evening when she as a Guide was talking to Sister Guides. Now her talk was to the mothers and friends of Guides and would show what the movement was intended to do towards the development of character and the fitting for good citizenship of our young girls. Youth with its consequent exuberance of spirits must have an outlet. And when they are directed into grooves where the mind, the heart and the body is trained to give of its best to the good of the Girl individually and to the community collectively is very evident.

She outlined the plans of formation of companies, what was expected of a Girl Guide, what her promises meant and the good effect of the general training. Tests for proficiency develop a practical knowledge of those home-making qualities which go so far to stabilize character.

The younger sisters the "Brownies" came in for a share of her attention and the variety of ways children may be trained by games, and work made a pleasure and a pride, was fully outlined. The Rangers also, or older sisters of Girl Guides carry on the work of their early training and promise to help in a wider sphere and bravely take their places as good citizens. Of the most unexpected material leaders were often developed and the good that is in the worst of us brought forth to glow with a sure and steady light.

At the conclusion Mrs. W. J. McIntyre who has worked among the girls for the past two years spoke in words of hearty commendation of the Girl Guide Movement and moved that a vote of thanks be tendered Miss Herrington by the C.W.L. Mrs. J. J. Johnson, seconded the motion and Mrs. J. B. McCready, President of the C. W. L., spoke in motion voting her appreciation of Miss Herrington's address and asking further information as to formation which the visitor graciously accorded.

Beside the members of the local subdivision C. W. L., many ladies interested in girls' work were present to hear the lecture. Mrs. Casey, President C. W. L. spoke highly of the work done among the girls by Mrs. McIntyre through whose efforts the Girl Guides of St. Dunstan's is an accomplished fact. The meeting closed by singing the National Anthem after which the regular business meeting of the subdivision was called. Reports showed much good work done by the Orphanage, Poor, Educational and Aged and Infirm committees. New business was projected and upon motion to adjourn a most profitable and enjoyable evening came to a close.

**HEAVIER TOLL OF TROUT**—A press despatch states: "To make good the anglers' inroads upon the fishing streams of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, the staffs of the Middleton, Windsor, Bedford and Margaree hatcheries have taken up the propagation of speckled or brook trout upon a more extensive scale than formerly. Last season they prospect ed a large part of Nova Scotia in search of places where trout eggs were obtainable in reasonable quantities. Owing to the extent of the district to be covered, only a small area was examined and no large finds made. The work will be carried on this year."

## Premier King Expected

previous conferences which Premier King has had lately with the more prominent of his supporters have given some force to predictions that the present year will see a general election. In such an event it is argued, Premier King will necessarily have to rest more seats in the west, even to maintain his present standing in the House. Among Liberals it is admitted that there is every likelihood of the Government losing seats east of the Ottawa. Losses which could be made up only by gaining ground on the prairies. In some quarters, it is thought that Premier King has that object in view in addition to seeking any Progressive support he can during the coming session.

Should neither Mr. Crerar nor Mr. Dunning enter the cabinet and the present negotiations bring no cabinet reconstruction, it is possible that the vacant portfolio of Minister of Justice, as has been previously intimated, will be filled by the appointment of Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Marine and the vacant portfolio. A number of Maritime members are still in town and the claim is being pressed that the portfolio be held by a man from the Maritimes.

**THE MEXICAN Revolution**

(Continued From Page One)

In the dispatches, this title was earned in the people's revulsion against the tyranny of their rulers. Obregon was a farmer, like many generals during our revolutionary era and Calles was a school teacher.

The first thing that Obregon did after becoming president was to cut down the size of the army. One hundred thousand soldiers were sent back into civilian life. Many of the generals who had not come out of civilian life and hundreds of colonels, majors, captains and lieutenants, who led an easy life at the expense of the people, opposed this very much, but as the money saved from military expenses was immediately transferred to the upbuilding of the school system, the people backed up the government in this program of military retrenchment. The army officers who were let out have, however, never ceased to intrigue against the Obregon government and many of those remaining in the military establishment belonging to the conservative and aristocratic class have joined with them. It is these militarists, joined with the professional politicians, whose looting has been interfered with, who are trying to overthrow the Obregon government.

Don L. Huerta, who was formerly as much trusted by Obregon as Ben edict Arnold was trusted by Washington, will probably not accomplish his ambition to be president of Mexico, even should the militarists succeed in overthrowing Obregon. In the event of their triumph they would undoubtedly impose one of the "old guard" Conservatives as president.

The news from Mexico indicates the enlisting of a new army by Obregon composed of farmers and industrial workers, a citizens' army, such as that which fought at Ixmiton and Bunker Hill. If Obregon can keep the militarists at bay until this new army can swing into action, the attempt to maintain a democratic republic to the south of us may succeed. If not, Mexico will again become the prey of armed factions, all the sacrifices of the last 12 years will have gone for naught, and one of the richest countries of the world in natural resources will sink into the mire of misery and poverty.
