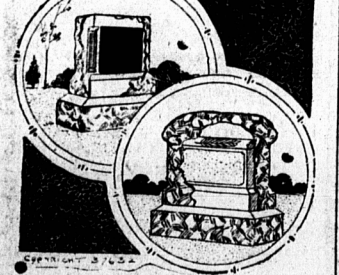

SMALLPOX IN QUEBEC IN AN ALARMING STATE.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, July 31—Utter and complete disregard of health laws in the matter of controlling smallpox is the condition of affairs which special inspectors of the Provincial Board of Health have found to prevail in Indian Lorette and Jeanne Lorette, two municipalities in the vicinity of Quebec City.

Absolutely no steps have been taken by the local authorities to deal with the situation and inspectors have been declared to investigate for the officials of the Provincial Board of Health.

In the city report the inspectors have found that no quarantine had been established and on their arrival they found people in the early stages of the disease walking about the streets and visiting friends. As a result the local authorities were told if they did not take immediate steps the situation would be taken in hand by the Provincial Board of Health and strict measures adopted.

INJURED BY RIOTERS.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, July 31—One man was killed and three were wounded by bullets and many others injured as the result of rioting on the Victoria docks this morning. Two thousand former strikers appeared for work at the docks and were attacked by a mob of strikers. Riotous outbreaks have also occurred at several other docks.

SEAL FISHERIES PASSES READING.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, July 31—The House of Commons tonight passed the second reading of the Seal Fisheries Bill giving effect to the convention between Great Britain, United States, Russia and Japan to prevent the extermination of the seal in the North Pacific.

ANOTHER STRIKE.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, July 31—Unless the iron foundries of this city grant a ten per cent wage increase and exemption from Saturday labor and a change from piece to time work, one hundred pattern makers will walk out tomorrow morning. Twenty manufacturing establishments will be affected.

PREMIER ASQUITH MAY VISIT CANADA.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, July 31—Mr. Churchill will decide within a day or two regarding his visit to Canada. The Mail states that it is now understood that Premier Asquith and First Lord of Admiralty will visit the Dominion after Mr. Borden's return. If the journey is made on one of Britain's Dreadnoughts, the visit might be made the occasion for an Imperial demonstration.

VOLE OF CONFIDENCE FOR TURKISH MINISTRY.

(Canadian Press) CONSTANTINOPLE, July 31—The new Turkish Ministry received a vote of confidence in the Chamber of Deputies today after it was announced that the Government was willing to enter into peace negotiations with Italy and the new Ministry program had been read.

The Government was sustained by a vote of 113 to 45, after the Grand Vizier had declared that the Government would resign unless Parliament gave its sanction to the program.

STEEL CORPORATION.

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, July 30—The financial statement of the United States Steel Corporation for the second quarter of the current year ending June 30 last was made public today after the usual meetings of the finance committee's board of directors.

The earnings for the quarter totaled \$25,102,265 after deducting all expenses incident to operation. The net increase amounted to \$18,429,294. After deducting interest for the quarter on outstanding bonds and the payment of regular dividends on preferred and common shares there is left a surplus for the quarter of \$56,483.

Small as is the surplus it compares most favorably with the showing in the quarter immediately preceding when only a small part of the common dividend was earned and it became necessary to take a greater part of the \$6,350,000 from the undivided surplus reported at the end of 1911.
