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HUNGARIAN CABINET WAS OVERTHROWN

Entente Mission in Budapest Has Delegated Governmental Authority to Archduke Joseph.

(Special to The Guardian.)
PARIS, August 7.—The Peace conference was advised today that the Hungarian Cabinet, headed by Jules Peidl, had been overthrown and that Archduke Joseph had established a ministry in Budapest. Advice to the conference stated that Rumanian forces had crossed the Danube into the business section of Budapest and were seizing supplies preparing to ship them to Rumania. The social democrats of Hungary still hope that the Allied and Associated Governments will not tolerate either Rumanian control of the country or that of a government by the reactionary grand dukes. Additional despatches reaching the conference from Budapest accounts of the Rumanian proceedings, report that they notified the Hungarians yesterday because the terms of the armistice laid down in the Rumanian ultimatum had not been accepted and that the Rumanians would cross the Danube immediately, later carrying out their threat.

Daring Flight Over the Rockies

VANCOUVER, Aug. 7.—Captain E. C. Hoy, D. F. C., left Minoru Park here this morning at 4:15 o'clock in an attempt to fly across the Canadian Rockies. At 5:15 a. m. the aviator passed over Chilliwack, favorable conditions prevailed. The flight is being made under the auspices of the Vancouver World, the Calgary Herald and the Lethbridge Herald. Captain Hoy expects to complete the flight to Calgary by way of Lethbridge about 8 o'clock tonight.

Aviator Arrives at Vernon B. C. VERNON, B. C., August 7.—Capt. E. C. Hoy, attempting a trans-Rocky flight arrived here at 7:18 o'clock this morning from Vancouver and left at 8:19 for Grands Forks. The flight from the coast, 225 miles, was made in three hours and six minutes.

Quebec Strikers Getting Weary

QUEBEC, August 7.—With one of their fellow union men held in jail and 91 others under charges, the cost of the ball, the members of the International Union of Shipbuilders employed at the Davie ship building plants at Lauzon and Quebec were uneasy today when they officially learned the militia would be called out against them at Lauzon if they refused to allow non-striking national union men to continue the work at the closed yards.

HALF MILLION POUNDS OF FOOD CONFISCATED

In Montreal During Last Year as Unfit for Human Consumption.

MONTREAL, Aug. 7.—According to the 1918 report of Dr. A. J. G. Hood, Chief Food Inspector for the city, which was made public yesterday, nearly half a million pounds of food was confiscated in Montreal last year having been found unfit for consumption, which is twice the amount seized for the same reasons in 1917.

Adriatic Question Likely Settled

ROME, Aug. 7.—The settlement of the Adriatic question affecting Italy and Jugo Slavia is imminent, according to the Popolo Romano today. In accordance with the settlement, it says, Fiume will be an independent state with the port internationalized.

Order of Merit For Lloyd George

LONDON, Aug. 7.—King George today conferred upon Premier David Lloyd George the Order of Merit as his appreciation of his services during the war.

In a letter to the Premier, dated Buckingham Palace, Aug. 5, announcing the award, the King says: "My Dear Prime Minister: Honors and rewards to officers of the Army, Navy and Air Forces have been submitted to Parliament. I feel that they share with me regret that it is not possible to express the nation's grateful recognition of the services rendered by the Prime Minister, both in carrying the war to a victorious end and in securing an honorable peace, to mark my appreciation of these services. It gives me great pleasure to confer upon you the Order of Merit. Yours very sincerely, George R. L."

110 SEPARATE STRIKES IN NEW YORK CITY

(Special to The Guardian.)
NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—More than 110 separate strikes are in progress in New York city, according to a statement tonight by Chief Inspector John Daly of the police department. Inspector Daly made the statement in explaining to officials of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company the department's difficulty in supplying enough policemen to guard the lines.

Warrants Served on Strike Leaders at Quebec

QUEBEC, Aug. 6.—Forty-five strikers, members of the International Union, upon whom warrants were served on Friday on the charge of having intimidated national unionism and prevented them from going to work, appeared in the police court here on Saturday.

They pleaded not guilty and were admitted to bail to appear on Tuesday.

At a meeting of the national Union held at Lauzon this afternoon it was decided that the men will meet at the College and march down to the works in a body. It is not anticipated that there will be any trouble.

Civilian Blind Make Painful Scene in British House of Commons

LONDON, Aug. 5.—Six blind men, whose helplessness had kept them out of the war, were ejected from the House of Commons today. About forty blind persons from all parts of the country were led by their guides to the House, where the claims of the sightless to assistance from the State were being debated. The Minister of Pensions had just concluded his reference to the treatment of men who had lost their sight in the war, when there was a commotion in the strangers' gallery. It was occasioned by a young man, who shouted: "Mr. Speaker, I protest. What about the civilian blind. When is Parliament going to do something to improve their condition?" Attendants were quickly on the scene and grappled with the man who had interrupted, who struggled fiercely before he was removed. Meantime, four other blind men joined in the protest. Two of them were forcibly ejected, but the others allowed themselves to be led quietly outside. After they had gone, an elderly man, sitting in the distinguished strangers' gallery, arose and attempted to address the Speaker. He also suffered from complete blindness, and when an attendant went up to him, he permitted himself to be conducted from the Chamber. The many members in the House witnessed the painful scene in silence.

U. S. SHOPMEN STRIKE SPREADING

275,000 Men Out. Demand 85 Cents Per Hour for Mechanics And 60 Cents for Helpers.

CHICAGO, Aug. 7.—Leaders of the Chicago district council of the Federated Railway Shopmen's Union, said tonight that 275,000 was a conservative estimate of the number of shopmen on strike throughout the country and that the movement was still spreading. They declared violence would not be countenanced by the organization and that so far as they knew no mail trains had been interfered with. L. M. Hawver, president of the District Council, speaking of responsibility for the strike, said the rank and file had demanded a strike despite the wishes of their Grand Lodge President, and that the men were determined to remain on strike until their demands for 85 cents an hour for mechanics and 60 cents for helpers had been granted.

Newark, N. J., Cuts Price of Pork

(Special to The Guardian.)
NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—In the effort to reduce the high cost of living Newark, N. J., began to do its part by disposing of bacon purchased from the War Department at an average price of fourteen cents per pound, less the price charged in stores. Each of the thirteen stations of the city exhausted its supply before eleven o'clock in the morning and had to get more from headquarters. The stations were open from ten in the morning to noon and from three to five in the afternoon.

Canadian Headquarters To be Given Up

(Special to The Guardian.)
LONDON, Aug. 7.—Coinciding with the cutting down of the headquarters staffs the Canadian overseas militia authorities have commenced to relinquish occupation of a number of buildings hitherto occupied in London, and in a few weeks will be concentrated in Argyle House. Among the quarters to be vacated are the present offices of the Overseas Ministry on Grosvenor Street, Pembroke House, the home of the medical and dental services, Green Arbor House, where the Canadian records are housed, the London Area, quartermasters stores on Great Poutney Street and the war trophies headquarters in Fourberrys Place. Sir Edward Kemp will remain in England for another month. It is understood he contemplates retirement from the Cabinet on returning to Canada.

Tribute to Canada

BOLSHEVIK CAPTURE TOWN OF ONEGA

British Prisoners are Being Well Treated by Bolsheviki.

(Special to The Guardian.)
LONDON, Aug. 7.—A war communication issued tonight admits that the Bolsheviki hold the town of Onega on the North Russian frontier, west of Archangel, strongly. An American Christian Association representative, who has returned to headquarters on parole, the communication adds, says the British prisoners captured in this region through a mutiny of the Russians, have been well treated and are now at Volodga.

W. L. MCKENZIE KING CHOSEN LIBERAL LEADER

His Selection was a Genuine Surprise to the Convention

OTTAWA, August 7.—Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King was elected leader of the Liberal party at the Liberal Convention in Ottawa this afternoon. On the first ballot there were four candidates, Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, Hon. W. S. Fielding, Hon. G. P. Graham and D. D. MacKenzie. They finished in the order named. On the announcement of the result of the second ballot Graham and MacKenzie dropped out of the contest. On the third ballot the voting stood King 476; Fielding 438. Hon. Mr. King was then declared elected.

As had been foreseen the convention was one that yielded naturally to stampe and during the past few days a general slump in the direction of any one of the candidates was not unexpected.

New Liberal Leader First German Cargo Sails From U. S.

(Special to The Guardian.)
PHILADELPHIA, PA., Aug. 7.—The American steamer Thala sailed today for Hamburg with the first cargo from Philadelphia, consigned direct to a German port since the war. Most of the cargo, 6000 tons, consisted of packages of food, clothing and toilet articles sent by individuals to their families in Germany. Captain Thompson was in command of the Thala.

Joint Purchase of Pork By Allied Countries

(Special to The Guardian.)
PARIS, Aug. 7.—The Allied governments are represented at a conference of three representatives in London, have agreed to undertake the joint purchase of pork produced through common buying in the United States. It is expected the arrangements will go into effect August 8. Germany, probably requires to buy pork products through the same agency in order to avoid competition.

U. S. MISSION TO GREAT BRITAIN To Encourage Purchase of Goods and Closer Relations With United States.

(Special to The Guardian.)
LONDON, Aug. 7.—Three Americans are here with missions. They are B. S. Cutter, chairman of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, to study the possibility of the United Kingdom buying more goods from the United States; Elliott H. Goodwin of the United States Chamber of Commerce to interest British business men in the inter-Allied conference this fall in New York; and William H. Appleton to acquaint British people with the movement of appreciation in America for British seamen's efforts during the war. They are being most cordially received.

Crest of the Prince of Wales

It may be interesting to those who are preparing decorations for the visit of H. R. H. The Prince of Wales to know something of the Badge and motto used by His Royal Highness. His crest is three ostrich feathers and the motto "Ich Dien" meaning I serve. It was first used by Edward the Black Prince, after he had found the body of The King of Bohemia who was killed at the Battle of Cressy in 1346. Crest and motto had been used by that monarch, and have been adopted by the Prince of Wales ever since. A wrong impression seems to be held by some that the words of the motto are German, but this is not so, as Bohemia was not in any way connected with Germany. There was also a tradition that the words were Welsh from "Eich Dien" meaning Here is the man, supposed to have been used by the English King when he presented the baby Prince to the Welsh people.

Sugar Ration For Feeding Bees

SUGAR RATION. ... LAWRENCE'S LONDON, Aug. 7.—Providing a sugar ration for bees is the latest problem the food controller here has been called upon to solve. He has ordered that bees are to have ten pounds of sugar for each hive, as artificial food to ward off starvation.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—The steamship Adriatic, which arrived today from Liverpool, via Halifax, where it discharged 140 Canadian officers and 1746 troops brought nearly 500 civilian passengers, including Sir William MacKenzie, the Rev. Morgan, formerly pastor of the Westminster Congregational church in London who comes to New York to become a professor in a school of pedagogy, and the Australian tennis team, Major Norman Brookes, Gerald T. Paterson, Raadolph Lycett, and R. C. Thomas.
