Mr. W. A. Stewart, of Charlottetown, was re-elected to the board of trustees at the annual meeting last night. At a subsequent meeting of the board members Mr. Stewart was re-elected board chairman. The following retiring trustees were also re-elected: Mr. L. T. Beaton, Bonshaw; Mrs. H. H. Horne, and Mrs. Arthur Henry, Charlottetown.

Mr. Ira Brown, Charlottetown, was re-elected secretary.

Mr. Stewart's general review of the year was followed by the adoption committee report by chairman Mrs. Arthur Henry; the home committee report read by the secretary, Mr. Ira Brown; the farm committee report by chairman Capt. T. G. Taylor; the school committee and school inspector's and the medical reports read by Mr. Brown; and the finance committee report presented by the committee chairman Mrs. H. S. Henderson. Miss Eva L. Beers, R.N., nurse in charge at the Orphanage, presented her report.

In a short discussion which followed the general business Major T. E. MacNutt referred to the problem of the mentally deficient cases mentioned in the medical report. The time was coming, he believed, when the government would have to provide for such cases in the City class rooms. The matter had been referred to in a report by the Grand Jury at the opening of term of the Supreme Court last year. There was at that time several mentally deficient children in the Infirmary.

Rev. H. D. Raymond, rector of St. Paul's Church, concurred with Major MacNutt in the belief that some additional provision for the case of mentally deficient children was necessary.

Rev. Mr. Raymond asked if the trustee board was considering making any provision for pensions for retiring members of the Orphanage staff and was told that no provision for such a plan was contained in the act of incorporation.

A vote of thanks was tendered St. Paul's Hall committee for the use of the hall for the meeting. Thanks were also extended all car owners and others, who assisted the trustees and Ladies Auxiliary.

### REVIEW OF THE YEAR 1936

Another year has rolled away and the work of the Orphanage is again up for review.

I have again been privileged to sit as chairman of the trustee board and though the amount of work has been considerably increased we together have so managed to conduct the affairs of the institution that we are able to report another surplus. Our sincere thanks for this success must go to all members of the board and to the many who assisted by contributions throughout the province but the outstanding worker has been the energetic chairman of our finance committee.

### Many Arrests And Executions In Soviet Political Purge

MOSCOW, June 18 — Russia's drive against enemies within was expanded tonight to include those charged with speculation in bread, tampering with the Soviet lumber industry, delaying automobile production and wrecking locomotives.

There was no indication of any lessening of the hunt for those accused of adhering to Leon Trotsky, exiled revolutionary leader, or of sabotage and conspiracy plots to overthrow the Soviet Union.

Already more than 100 persons have been executed by firing squads. Many thousands are believed to be in jails and labor camps. Denunciations of "wreck-

### AIR SERVICE IS DISCUSSED

Daily 16-hour Trans-Canada Service Is Visualized.

OTTAWA, June 18 — (CP)—Daily 16-hour passenger and mail flights between Montreal and Vancouver by late summer, complete daily coast-to-coast service (linking all principal Canadian cities within two years, were envisioned here tonight by Transport Minister C. D. Howe.

Discussing modern air operations in the Dominion in an address to members of the Engineering Institute of Canada, Mr. Howe forecast a complete All-Canada service. He plans to make the 5,000 mile journey between Montreal and Vancouver in 16 hours, the same day, making the 3,000 mile journey between sunrise and dark. The service will be formally inaugurated shortly after and extended to Halifax early next year.

Mr. Howe was chief speaker at the dinner which featured entertainment provided by Ottawa members of the Engineering Institute of Canada to some 30 of their associates who had attended the semi-centennial meeting in Montreal earlier this week. President G. J. Desbarats of Ottawa, introduced the Minister.

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### SOVIET FLIERS SEEK TO BLAZE ARCTIC TRAIL

Leave Moscow On Epic Non-stop Flight To Oakland, California.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 18 — Soviet Russia's long-distance airplane flashed its arrival over the North Pole and then roared through Arctic mists tonight en route to Oakland in an attempted 6,000 mile non-stop flight from Moscow.

A virtually leak-proof censorship lifted for a few hours to disclose the progress of the plane, on a flight which one expert termed one of the most epoch-making and daring in aviation history.

General William E. Gilmore estimated tonight the fliers were 550 miles south of the North Pole at nine p. m. AST.

"We are three hours from the Pole, flying nicely," said the first report, received at four p. m. AST, about 18 hours after the craft left Moscow in secrecy.

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### REBELS CLAIM CONTROL

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Basque Government officials, fleeing from the capital, were reported to have established themselves at Turis, some 20 miles west of Bilbao. A defence junta remained in the capital to direct fighting.

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### FRENCH REGIME FACES CRISIS

#### Threatens To Resign If Special Powers Refused.

PARIS, June 18 — A threat to resign if it is not granted full emergency financial powers by Monday was issued tonight by the Popular Front government in response to the Senate Finance Committee's refusal to approve its requested legislation.

Last Tuesday the government's emergency financial powers, which Communist members of the Chamber of Deputies threatened for a day not to support the bill. They finally gave it support.

An authorized statement released tonight said the government "would resign if it did not possess by Monday the proper means to assure the defence of the Franc." Finance Minister Laval said Sunday at the latest was described as "indispensable."

A clash between government spokesmen and members of the Senate Finance Committee seemed likely in the Senate tomorrow as both groups refused to budge in their dispute over the cabinet's demand for extraordinary financial powers.

### Quebec Artist Held In Death Of Mother Of Seven Children

VERDUN, Que., June 18 — (CP)—Red-eyed and weary from a sleepless vigil of 36 hours beside the grave of his mother, Charles E. Herd, 36, was under close surveillance tonight in jail here after being taken into custody on a charge of murdering his friend of long standing, Mrs. Elizabeth Armstrong.

Soaked to the skin from a steady rain that beat down on him as he watched over his mother's grave in Mount Royal Cemetery, a tired and hungry Montrealer was this morning to be arrested by detectives from the suburban City of Verdun.

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
