Asakusa Kannon-ji is situated in the great pleasure district of Tokyo and the fires which swept the capital following the earthquake last September destroyed the whole of the district, but stopped almost at the entrance to the temple compound. This seemingly miraculous sparing of the temple was regarded as a favor of the gods, hence the increasing number of people who go there every day.

Written Oracles. At the temple are sold all sorts of charms for driving away evil spirits, for protection against sickness, and for other spiritual benefactions. There also may be purchased for a small sum written oracles, which are supposed to give great spiritual guidance in weighty matters.

It is said that an average of 300 yen is received daily at the temple for such written oracles. The impressive evidence of the Japanese belief in the supernatural. Most of the people who buy these oracles belong to the middle or lower classes, to whom such things appeal. The questions on which they seek spiritual guidance include whether certain speculations will be profitable, whether good luck will attend the opening of a new business premises, whether the removal of other places will be pleasing to the "Kannon-sama," and so on.

Young women ask if their lovers are true, or if their marriage will bring happiness. The great loss of life and property in the September disaster has caused many to resort to the oracles to find out whether their loved ones will return, or if lost property will be restored. The Japanese are very superstitious in regard to their dwellings, and many go to the temple to ask guidance as to the location of their new homes or which direction they should face.

One of the things in this famous temple to which the attention of visitors is attracted is an image enclosed in a case covered with wire netting. In the meshes of the netting and in various parts of the case are hung countless tiny talismans once worn by infants. This image represents the god who watches over children, and the tiny garments were hung there by anxious mothers or fathers in the belief that by so doing the god would restore the health of their sick children by whom the garments had been worn.

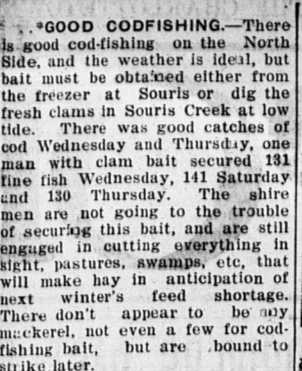

Lobster Industry In The Dominion. Lobster is one of the chief industries connected with the fisheries of the Maritime Provinces and each year millions of dollars' worth of these table delicacies are taken from the traps of fishermen in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and along Canada's Atlantic seaboard.

The total catch of lobsters in Nova Scotia last year was 172,720 cwt., valued at \$3,081,647, as compared with 173,706 cwt. in 1922, with a value of \$2,913,087. The fishing in western Nova Scotia which opened on March 1, was carried on under abnormal conditions. Ice was piled along the shore until late in the spring, making roving operations impossible.
