SACKVILLE, N. B., July 20—Scott Spencer, veteran pacer from Harry Hirsch's Sydney, N. S., stables today won the feature \$500 free-for-all on a harness racing card here. The Spencer's straight-heat victory in a four-horse field was the best performance of the day.

The Hirsch horse beat out Eddie Scott, owned by A. D. Napke of Newcastle, N.B., in 2:13 4-5, 2:09 and 2:12. His time in the second heat was the fastest on the four-class card.

Lee Brewer Sets New Trotting Mark At Parkview Track

Giving great trotting performances in the final two heats after finishing fifth in the first mile, Lee Brewer, owned and driven by Emmett Bernard yesterday, was the spotlight at Parkview Raceway harness racing meeting when he lowered the track trotting record card 2:11 1-3 in the second mile and then further reduced it to 2:11 flat in the third and final heat of his winning and generally unexpected victory in the Number Two event.

But while the Brewer's performance stood out there were many other highlights in an afternoon of thrilling finishes, hard battling and upsets as all four favorites once again this season failed to stand up to the onslaught of speed thrown at them by less-favored entrants.

In some cases the winning horse had a comfortable margin but this was more than made up for by the battles going on behind the leader in the runner-up spot, as closely bunched fields would come racing to the wire so close together that several times it took a photo finish picture to separate them.

Buddy Budlong, beaten in the stretch the first trip, came back to outtrot the field in the Number One event over four other starters; Bee Budlong, again at the top of her form, came from behind in every mile to chalk up a straight heat victory in the No. 3 event, while young Sterling Willis, just getting into the racing game, performed like a veteran when he drove veteran Neil Chochatdale to a straight heat win in the fourth and final event on the card.

The first mile of the race was easily the most stunning of the afternoon with the youngster, after staving off the challenge of his father's Lady Worthy 2nd in the first mile, breaking his mare to clean cut victories in the next two heats.

Sterling Willis, the baby of yesterday's drivers climaxed the great program with his three-heat victory with Neil Chochatdale. Taking the lead in the first mile he acted like a veteran as he kept his pacer in front of Lady Worthy 2nd in the race to the wire in the first mile; he came through with like performances the next two. He got his mare away on the backstretch and kept her there, outfooting Abegweit Milady in the second heat and then beating out Calumet Onward in the final mile of the afternoon.

Davis Cup Play Begins Today At Montreal

MONTREAL, July 20 — (CP) — Rated Canada's foremost tennis ace, Henri Rochon and Brendan Macken of Montreal today drew starting assignments in tomorrow's opening singles matches of the North American Davis Cup tie against the confident Australians.

The draw pits Macken against Billy Sidwell in the curtain-raiser and Rochon against Frank Sedgman, 21-year-old rookie member of the Australian team, in the afterpiece.

Canada's best is not expected to be good enough to upset the sure-stroking Aussies who are overwhelming favorites to sweep the matches in straight sets. Macken now has displaced Rochon as the player most likely to make the strongest showing for Canada.

Jack Bromwich, wispy-haired 30-year-old playing captain, kept himself out of the Aussie starting lineup. But the veteran Davis Cupper likely will get into action with Sedgman in Friday's doubles match.

Walt Stohberg and Lorne Main of Vancouver, Canada's other color-bearers, also are slated for action later in the series. Stohberg remains a strong choice as a partner for Macken in doubles. Main is a certain starter in one of two singles matches scheduled for Saturday.

The first match is scheduled to start at 3:30 p.m. A sell-out crowd of 2,500 is expected to be on hand.

In four previous meetings since 1914 in cup tie play, teams from Australia won over Canada without the loss of a match. Since 1900, the Australians have reached the challenge round 17 times, and they won the cup seven times.
