The steamer on which Captain Weeks sailed will probably arrive in Halifax on Friday next. Upon his arrival in this city a parade will be held and a banquet will be given.

LEMONS have taken a sharp advance in St. John, owing to the increased demand on account of la grippe. Upon enquiry we learn that no advance has been made in Charlottetown.

THE New Board of Water Commissioners held their first meeting on Saturday afternoon having signed the requisite bonds and furnished sureties at noon. Mr. S. W. Crabbe was elected Chairman of the Board.

SINGING EVANGELIST McLEAN of P. E. Island, is assisting Rev. A. T. Dykeman in his revival services in the Fairville Baptist church. The services are being largely attended and are quite successful.—St. John Star.

MESSRS. Lowe Bros. are constructing a building on the corner of the Tremain premises for C. Lyons & Co. The new building although temporary will afford the firm office space and an opportunity to operate their scales.

THE telephone company are pushing forward the repairs on their different lines with all speed possible. Outside of the city connections have been re-established with all points with the exception of Souris and it is hoped that in a very short time it too will be connected. In the city the ice has not hindered quite as much as in the country. Up to Saturday evening 145 out of 248 telephones disconnected by the storm were in working order.

THE GUARDIAN's attention has been called to the inadequate fire appliances of the city schools. It appears that the water service in Prince Street School has been greatly impaired by the placing of sewerage. The School Board applied to the Water Commissioners in the fall of 1900 for a larger main to the school, but owing to the early winter the matter was not attended to. It would be well for the School Board to see that the fire extinguishers and the limited service now in connection with the schools are revised and that proper fire drills are inaugurated at once. It will certainly be too late when an accident compels an action which can easily be attended to now.

Mr. A. J. B. Mellish who had been lecturing in Halifax, Antigonish and Picton came to the City on Saturday afternoon having crossed via the Capes after spending nearly a week at Picton. Although crossing occupied six hours Mr. Mellish says that very little heavy ice was encountered and the general opinion of those who crossed was that if a winter steamer was there a crossing could easily have been effected. The numerous leads, M. Mellish contends would have aided the steamer in making a quick passage.

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
