Keep Minard's in the home. Who May Vote In Elections For Commons

OTTAWA, Feb. 7.—(CP)—Unlucky voters will operate in the Dominion election on March 26 just as it has done since 1920. Approximately every adult British subject will be able to vote regardless of property or income, although it is comparatively few years since the suffrage was much more restricted.

Some Disqualified There are certain specific exceptions to that rule, however. The Dominion Electoral Act states that the vote may be exercised by a British subject (by birth or naturalization), man or woman, who is 21 years of age or more, and who is not a member of the armed forces in the First Great War. Persons confined in penal or mental institutions and persons disqualified for corrupt or illegal practices are not on the lists either.

Steps To Franchise The electoral laws of the provinces governed all elections to the House of Commons from Confederation in 1867 to 1920, when parliamentary franchise qualifications for voters throughout the country in Dominion elections. In 1920 provincial qualifications for voters were applied to Dominion voting rights down to 1920.

Extended To Women Women received the right to vote in Dominion elections for the first time during the present war. They then only in the three prairie provinces; at first, Ontario and British Columbia did likewise in 1917 and New Brunswick in 1918. Nova Scotia granted women the vote on the same property qualification as men in 1918.

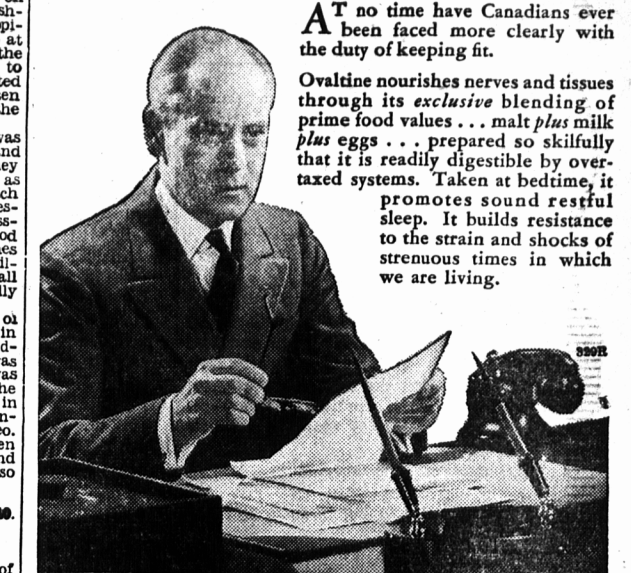

Resale Of P.E.I. Foundation Seed Potatoes

OTTAWA, Feb. 7.—Preparations are now being made by the Agricultural Supplies Committee for the resale of Prince Edward Island of foundation seed potatoes purchased by the Committee last fall.

These potatoes were purchased so that a quantity of foundation stock would be available for growers of certified seed. There was a grave danger that all available foundation stock would be shipped from the province, to the detriment of the potato industry.

The amount of foundation stock obtained by the Committee was limited and resale will be made only to "select growers" that is, districts known to be suitable for the production of certified seed.

Growers have found it impossible to maintain seed to certification standards in some of the commercial seed areas without more and more roguing each year, until it became unprofitable to plant such marginal seed.

The plan for resale, announced by the Agricultural Supplies Committee is to distribute the foundation stock in quantities of not less than 10 bushels at cost, namely \$1.00 per bushel in Prince Edward Island. Transport charges are to be paid by the purchaser.

The bulk of the foundation seed being offered for resale by the Committee is of the Green Mountain variety. Only very limited quantities of Irish Cobbler are available.

Growers who intend to purchase foundation seed from the Agricultural Supplies Committee should write to the Chief, Plant Protection Division, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, stating the amount of seed they wish to buy. If they come within the "select grower" classification, an official application form will be forwarded to them. Applications will be received up to March 15th, 1940.

The Committee reserves the right to refuse any application for a smaller quantity than that for which application was made.

Many Casualties In Politicians As Fight Begins.

OTTAWA, Feb. 8.—(CP)—The Commons just won't be the same when parliament meets again, for nearly a score of veteran Commons members are not contesting the March 26 election. Ill-health or the years have caught up with some well-known parliamentarians; others have been elevated to the Senate or retired from the federal field.

The green chamber will miss Hon. Charles Dunning, the former minister of finance whose political career stretched back 35 years. Dunning has forced him out of active politics this time and he will not seek re-election. Another member of the Liberal front bench, Hon. J. C. Elliott, former postmaster-general until an illness forced him to drop his portfolio a year ago, has been appointed to the Senate.

Hon. W. R. Motherwell who is 80 and was the oldest Liberal member in the last house, is retiring. Long-time Commons member, Hon. J. C. Elliott, former postmaster-general until an illness forced him to drop his portfolio a year ago, has been appointed to the Senate.

Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, former Conservative Prime minister, is living in England and will not be a candidate for election. He attended the first three sessions of the 19th parliament in debate probably more than any other member.
