**Roosevelt Plans Broad Program Of Labor Legislation**

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) WASHINGTON, Nov. 11—Interpreting the United States election as an "unmistakable mandate," President Roosevelt today recommended a broad program of labor legislation by the States and pledged federal reinforcement "when problems assume an interstate or a national character." In a letter read to the Third National Conference on labor legislation, he enumerated "reasonably short working hours" and

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"adequate annual incomes" among desired objectives. No mention of the Supreme Court was made; but the court's action on legislation like NRA, the Guffey Act and the New York wage law—aimed at similar objectives—entered into the discussions among the delegates. Should the projected federal and state efforts fall athwart the Supreme Court, it was generally assumed, in view of the Democratic platform that a constitutional amendment would be sought. The desirability of recommending one at once received some consideration in the private discussions.

**Turkey May Now Remilitarize Dardanelles**

PARIS, Nov. 11—Turkey's right to remilitarize the Dardanelles, actually admitted last July, was formally recognized by seven nations today.

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nations, were exchanged by representatives of France, Great Britain, R. S. Bulgaria, Greece, Germany and Yugoslavia, as well as Turkey.

Japan, which made reservations in signing the Montreux convention, and Australia were the two signatories not participating in the exchange of ratifications.

The Montreux agreement terminated the Lausanne Treaty, under which Turkey was forbidden to rearm the region around the Dardanelles, the Sea of Marmora and the Bosphorus, which separate European and Asiatic Turkey.

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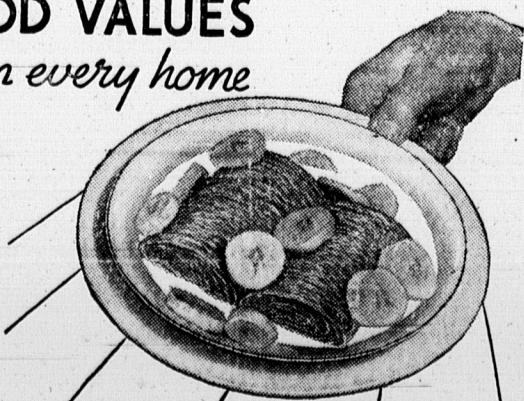
