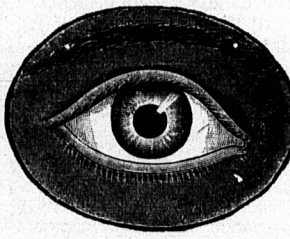

SWEDISH GOVERNMENT NEEDS COPPER CARGOES SEIZED BY BRITAIN. LONDON, Feb. 23.—The seizure of a considerable quantity of unwrought copper for Sweden, which was brought over in two neutral and three British ships, came up before the prize court to-day.

The counsel for the Swedish company said he was authorized by the Swedish minister to say that the copper was urgently needed in Sweden in order to fill government contracts. He asked for an undertaking by the British government that the government, which had requisitioned the copper, would not use it before a legal settlement was reached.

The Attorney-General said the British government, while it was prepared to act reasonably in the matter, could not give such an undertaking. If the Swedish minister desired to make any representations, he added, he must do so through the Foreign Office. The case was adjourned on the application of the Attorney-General.

READY TO TAKE JOHNSON IF HE STEPS ON AMERICAN SOIL. EL PASO, Texas, Feb. 22.—Jack Curley, promoter of the Johnson-Willard fight, said that nothing definite had been done regarding the reported postponement of the bout set for March 6 at Juarez, Mexico. He said, however, that the fight would be postponed if Johnson arrived in poor condition.

How the negro will arrive from Cuba, where he landed yesterday, Curley would not make known. Villa's delay in attacking Tampico had endangered the plan for Johnson to enter the United States. It was learned that American border officials were on the lookout should he attempt to enter through the United States, on account of the indictment against him at Chicago.

PLAN TO HELP OPERA SINGERS IN DISTRESS. PARIS, Feb. 23.—A committee is being formed in Paris by patrons of music representing France, Great Britain, Russia, Belgium and the United States, with the object of creating and endowing an institution for the relief of distress among opera singers, chorists and musicians. Forty opera houses in France and Belgium have been indefinitely closed.

Atto H. Kahn, chairman of the executive board of the Metropolitan Opera House, New York, it is understood, is directing American participation in the plan. It is intended to convert one of the Parisian theatres into an operatic academy, in which Jean De Reszke and Henry Russell, director of the Boston Opera Company, will assist.

GERMAN STEAMER HOLGER INTERNED AT BUENOS AYRES. BUENOS AYRES, Feb. 23.—The stipulated period during which the German steamer Holger, which arrived here Thursday, might remain in this port having expired, the Argentine authorities have declared the vessel interned.

Newspapers here publish a report that the German auxiliary cruiser Kronprinz Wilhelm is actually in the waters of the River Plate, having on board sailors from vessels which she has sunk.

The Holger, when she arrived here, had on board the crews of several merchant ships sunk during January and February by the cruiser Kronprinz Wilhelm.

"THE OLD CURIOSITY SHOP" AT PRINCE EDWARD

"The Old Curiosity Shop," one of Charles Dickens' most famous novels, the dramatization of which was presented at the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday in five parts, attracted big crowds to the theatre.

"In some cases we may see Dickens to better advantage than we can read him, and no pains have been spared to make the leading characters of 'Old Curiosity Shop' so real that we almost feel them. Nice attention to settings, to costumes, to an infinity of detail, afford an atmosphere of other value than that of supporting the narrative—the felicity with which they are presented records a historical period, offers strong contrast with present conditions and stimulates philosophical reflection upon their significance. From a purely impressionist point of view, I could feel the helpless plight of pure minded Little Nell in her pitiful struggle against the wretched greed of every one she met, including the only one to whom she could turn, her last and only friend, her grandfather. Opposed to her sweetness and delicate sensibilities was a lust for money made hideous in Quilp, made amusing in others, made tragic in her gambling-mad grandfather. Quilp represents greed in the raw state.

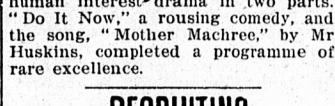
"The other types in 'Old Curiosity Shop' are admirably selected, inasmuch as they are easily distinguishable and seem to fit into their places without a lot of make-up. After the play gets well started, the construction is very much better than could be expected where characterization is the main issue. There is seen an element of suspense introduced for a while, the 'single gentlemen's' pursuit of Little Nell and her grandfather. Dickens diverts attention from the main issue constantly, very effectively in the relations of Dick Swiveller and 'The Marchioness,' but the photo-drama follows the central line of interest, merely introducing the well-known types where they are necessary. The play will please Dickens' many lovers and deserves high praise because it gives a living picture of the epoch in complete and artistic composition and form."

A thrilling society drama, "The Fortunes of Margaret," was a story of a sister's sacrifice and of a brother's ingratitude. Unjustly accused by her father of her brother's crime the girl goes out into the world and succeeds by sheer merit. It was a splendid human interest-drama in two parts. "Do It Now," a rousing comedy, and the song, "Mother Macree," by Mr Huskins, completed a programme of rare excellence.
