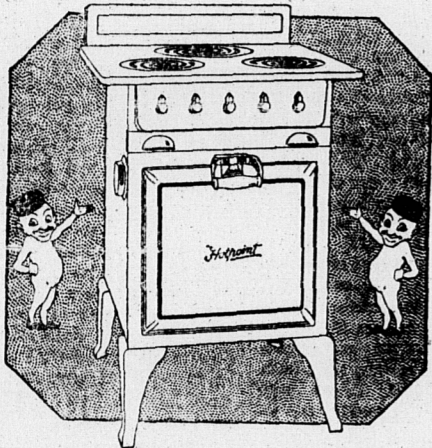

**HONOUR CONFERRED**—Ven Archdeacon C. de W. White, D.D., rector of St. Mary's Church, Summerside, is receiving the congratulations of his many friends on the honour conferred upon him last week at King's College, Halifax, where he was made a Doctor of Divinity. The Archdeacon and Mrs White returned on Saturday evening after being away since Monday visiting in Nova Scotia as well as attending the formal opening of the new college of King's University. Thursday was a momentous day at King's College when the new college and chapel was formally opened. At 11 o'clock the chapel in the new college was consecrated with all the impressive ritual of the Church of England. Archbishop Worrell, performed the ceremony, assisted by Dr. Moore, President of the College and Bishop Hadden. The sermon was delivered by Bishop Richardson of New Brunswick. At the Convocation which was held at 3 p.m. Canon Cody of Toronto was the chief speaker and in his inspiring address congratulated the President of the College on being able to continue to have a residential college, which was a very important factor in the success of any University. It was at the formal opening of the new college that Ven Archdeacon White received the honour of Doctor of Divinity from the hands of Dr. Moore, the honour being granted by the Convocation Assembly in regular course. Besides Ven. Archdeacon White three other clergymen were given the degree of D.D., namely:— Ven Archdeacon Scoll of Guelph, Ont.; Canon E.A. Harris of Mahone Bay N.S. and Rev Mr Armstrong of St John, N.B. At the close of the Convocation a reception was held at the residence of Dr. Moore, which is now situated in the new building. Among those present, besides Ven Archdeacon White, D.D., and Mrs White was Major McNutt of Charlottetown. It will be of interest to Anglicans of Prince Edward Island to know that the work of repairing the Cathedral at Halifax is still going on and that \$90,000 have been raised for this work up to the present time. At the evening service in St. Mary's Church on Sunday Ven Archdeacon White, D.D., gave some interesting details of the formal opening of the new college at King's University for the benefit of his congregation. He also paid a very high tribute to the late Mr. A. C. Rogers of Summerside and expressed regret that he was not able to officiate at the funeral services. —S
