THE AMERICAN MEAT IN BRITISH PARLIAMENT

John Burns, Leader of County Board takes up the Question—Enquiries to be Made of the United States Government—Do not Want Undesirable Food Stuffs Dumped Upon People.

LONDON, June 9.—(Special)—John Burns, the president of the local Government Board has requested the foreign office to communicate with the State Department, Washington, and ascertain to what extent reliance can be placed on the system of meat inspection undertaken by the Bureau of Industry.

His announcement that he had taken action was in reply to a question put in the House of Commons today by William Field, Nationalist member of the St. Patrick's division of Dublin and President of the Irish Cattle Traders and Stock Owners Association.

Mr. Burns added that he had ascertained that a quantity of boneless beef and pork is imported into this country from America and converted into sausages which are sold as English produce. He admitted that there were serious difficulties in the way of efficient British inspection of some of these imported foods, but said the local government board had taken action to see that the local authorities exercised their power to the full extent.

JAPANESE OFFICIALS CAUSING TROUBLE

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Eastern mails bring news of the friction between the British merchants and the Japanese officials, resulting from the difficulties experienced by the former in obtaining access to the markets of Manchuria. It is charged that the Japanese seized the opportunity afforded by their military occupancy of the country to concentrate all the trade in the hands of their own subjects and not only is the country glutted with goods brought in by the Japanese to a point that makes it practically impossible to find openings for European goods, but through their control of the transportation routes in Manchuria, and Korea, the Japanese officials are able to discriminate against traders of other nationalities.

THE PRESBYTERIANS AND PROTESTANTS

LONDON, Ont., June 10.—(Special)—At the Protestant Free Church pulpits were occupied today by visiting Assemblymen. Rev. Dr. Magill of Halifax was the preacher in the Assembly Church this morning. The other ministers from the Maritime Provinces, who officiated today in various churches are the Revs. Principal Falconer, W. H. Sedgwick Charlottetown, A. J. McDonald, Sydney; and J. J. McArkill, Fort Kent.

BELIEVED NOTHING CAN SAVE TUCKER

Boston, June 9.—(Special)—Governor Guild Jr, today refused the request for a reprieve made by the attorney of Charles L. Tucker, under sentence of death for the murder of Mable Page, two years ago. A mass meeting was held today to protest against the execution. Speakers were unimportant, but were vociferously cheered.
