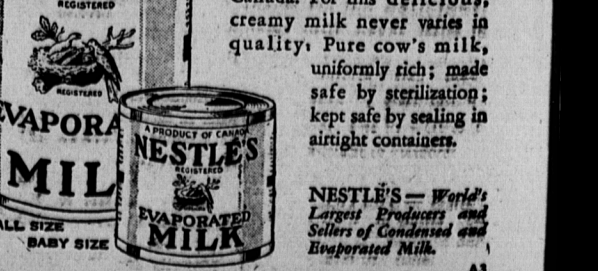
TESTS OF REFLECTORS ON HIGHWAYS SUCCEED
